Executive Summary Report

This project was designed to illustrate perceptions about driving distance tourism with special emphasis on the five Northern-most counties of Idaho. Respondents were drawn from Washington, Oregon, Montana, Idaho, British Columbia and Alberta, Canada.

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Q.44 When you think of North Idaho, do you think of it as a place to visit year-round or mostly in a specific season? 36

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METHODOLOGY

Robinson Research was commissioned to conduct a telephone survey Coeur d’Alene Convention and Visitor’s Bureau (a division of the Coeur d’Alene Chamber of Commerce) to conduct a telephone survey with adults in households in Washington, Idaho, Oregon, Montana, and the Canadian Provinces of British Columbia and Alberta. Robinson Research leased the one-time use of a list of households determined to be active, based upon a variety of known variables including, but not limited to, subscriptions to print and other media, and other lifestyle factors. The first question in the survey disqualified households reporting no members having taken an overnight (or longer) driving trip within the last 12 months. There were no other demographic, or lifestyle, quotas employed. The respondents in this survey of “active” households averaged a few years older than we would see in a general survey of all adults in the sample area. Surveys of active households, typically, averaged a few years older than would a completely random survey of adults. Another noteworthy anomaly in this sampling was the fact that the target respondents were considerably more likely than average to allow the phone calls to go to voicemail (or answering machine). Their active status was definitely verified by the fact that they were rarely available to take the call.

The overall purpose of this study was to determine awareness, knowledge, and perceptions of Northern Idaho as a driving trip, tourist destination.

For this study, 1,200 completed interviews were conducted. Katherine (Hoyer) Coppock, Director of the Coeur d’Alene Convention and Visitor Bureau division of the Coeur d’Alene Chamber of Commerce, provided Robinson Research with tourism query data, lodging registration data, data from various entertainment venues and data from counties outside of Kootenai County. From these, Robinson Research submitted a sample plan with the percentages of the 1,200 surveys to be conducted with households in each of the following areas: (the percentages actually surveyed were nearly identical to the quotas)

The surveys were conducted between September 24, 2016 and November 15, 2016.

No fewer than fifteen percent (15%) of the interviews were monitored in their entirety, and an additional ten percent (10%) were called back by a supervisor for verification of key points of the data. Interim trial runs of the data were cross-tabulated by interviewer as a quality assurance procedure.

A 1,200-sample survey has a margin of error of +/- 3 percent, which means that, in theory, results have a ninety-five percent (95%) chance of coming within +/-3 percentage points of results that would have been obtained if all adults in “active” households within the sample area had been interviewed.

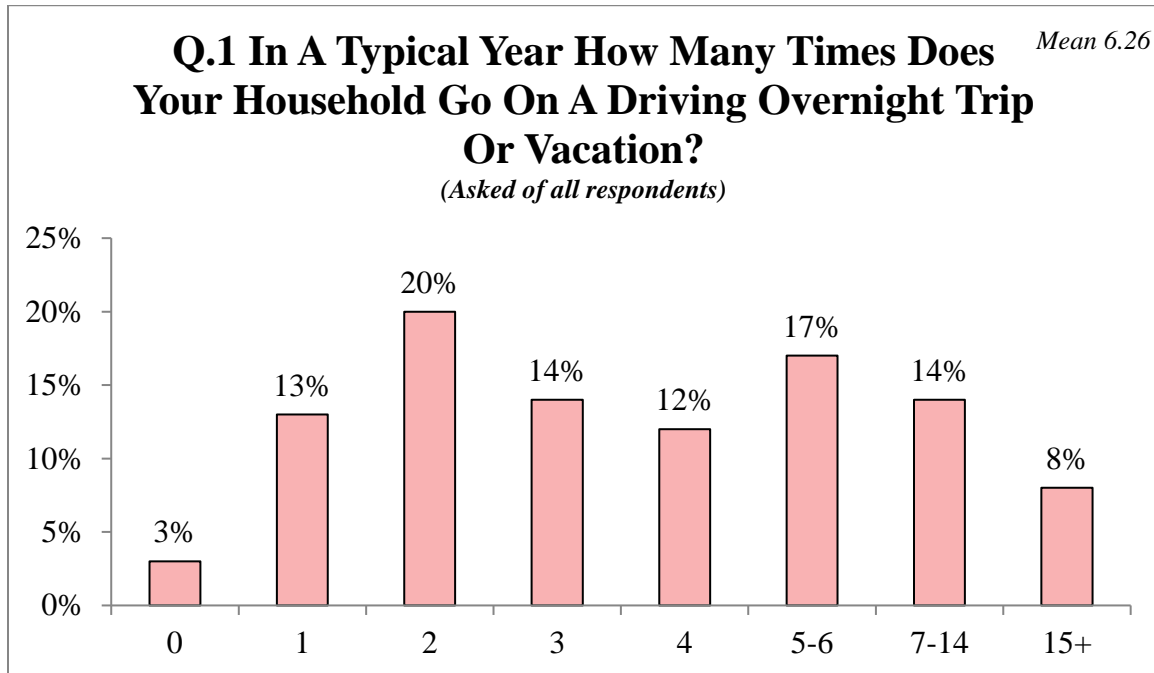

- Three in five respondents reported that gas prices increasing by \$1 would not cause them to change their driving get-away habits
- One in four respondents mentioned Coeur d'Alene Lake as the single biggest attraction in North Idaho

- Two in five respondents mentioned cost/gas prices/exchange rate might be a good reason to not select North Idaho as a driving trip destination
- Two in three respondents reported having visited North Idaho for recreation
- The average respondent reported visiting North Idaho 9.96 times in the past ten years
- Seven in ten respondents described North Idaho as a destination, as opposed to a place to stop on the way to another destination

DETAILED OBSERVATIONS

Q.1 In a typical year how many times do one or more members of your household go on a driving overnight trip or vacation?

This question was asked of all respondents (n=1,200).

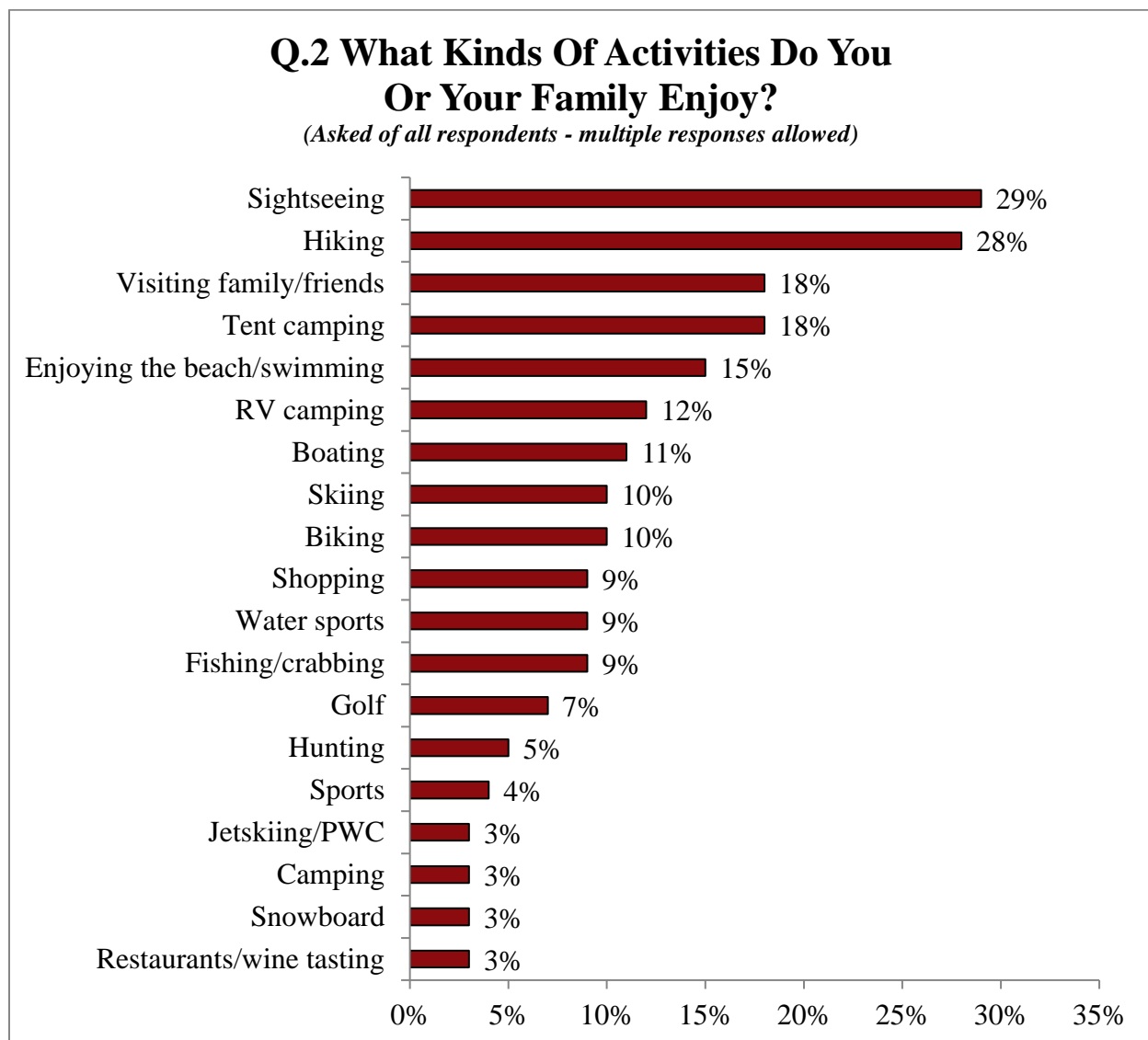


The average respondent reported taking 6.26 driving overnight trips or vacations in a typical year.

Respondents in Eastern Oregon, Alberta, and Eastern Montana were more likely than average to report a lower number.

Q.2 What kinds of activities do you or your family enjoy?

This question was asked of all respondents (n=1,200). Respondents were not read a list of possible responses from which to choose. Multiple responses were allowed.



Three in ten (29%) respondents reported enjoying sightseeing. Nearly as many (28%) reported enjoying hiking.

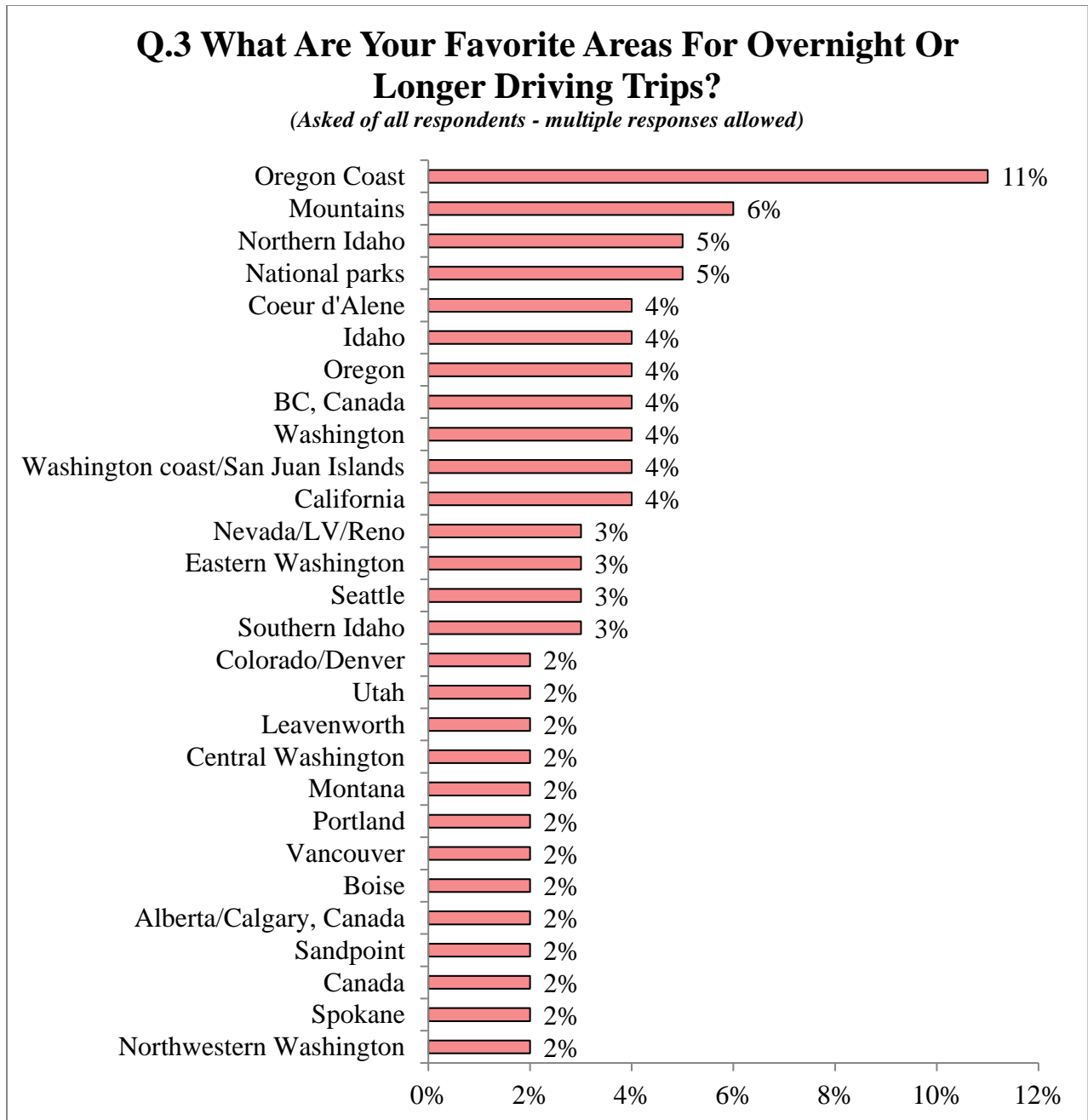
Likelihood of mentioning hiking decreased with the age of respondent.

Households with children under the age of 13 were less likely than average to mention sightseeing.

Respondents in Western Washington were less likely than average to mention RV camping or hunting.

Q.3 What are your favorite areas for overnight or longer driving trips?

This question was asked of all respondents (n=1,200). Respondents were not read a list of possible responses from which to choose. Multiple responses were allowed.

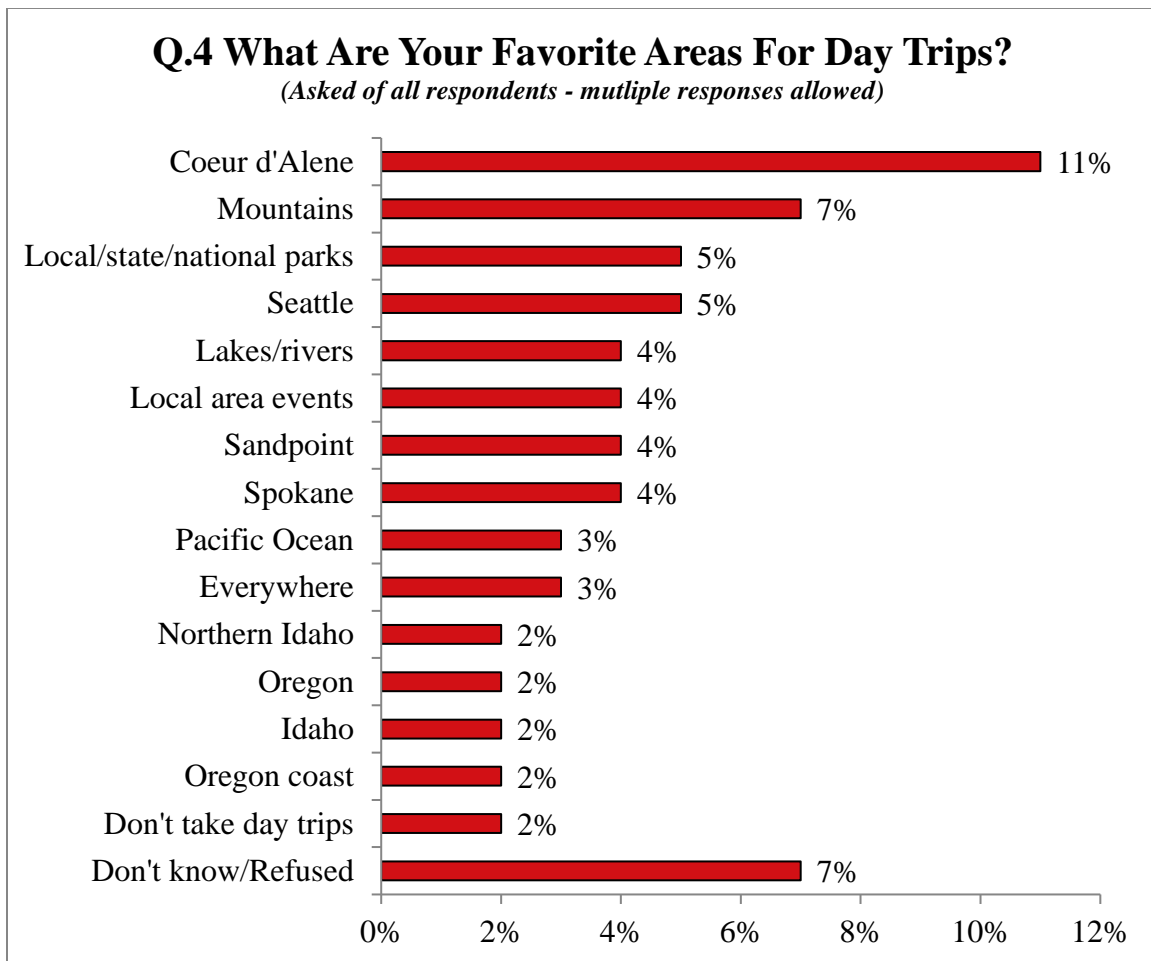


One in nine (11%) respondents mentioned the Oregon coast. One in twenty-five (4%) respondents mentioned Coeur d’Alene.

Respondents in Southern Idaho were less likely than average to mention Coeur d’Alene.

Q.4 What are your favorite areas for day trips?

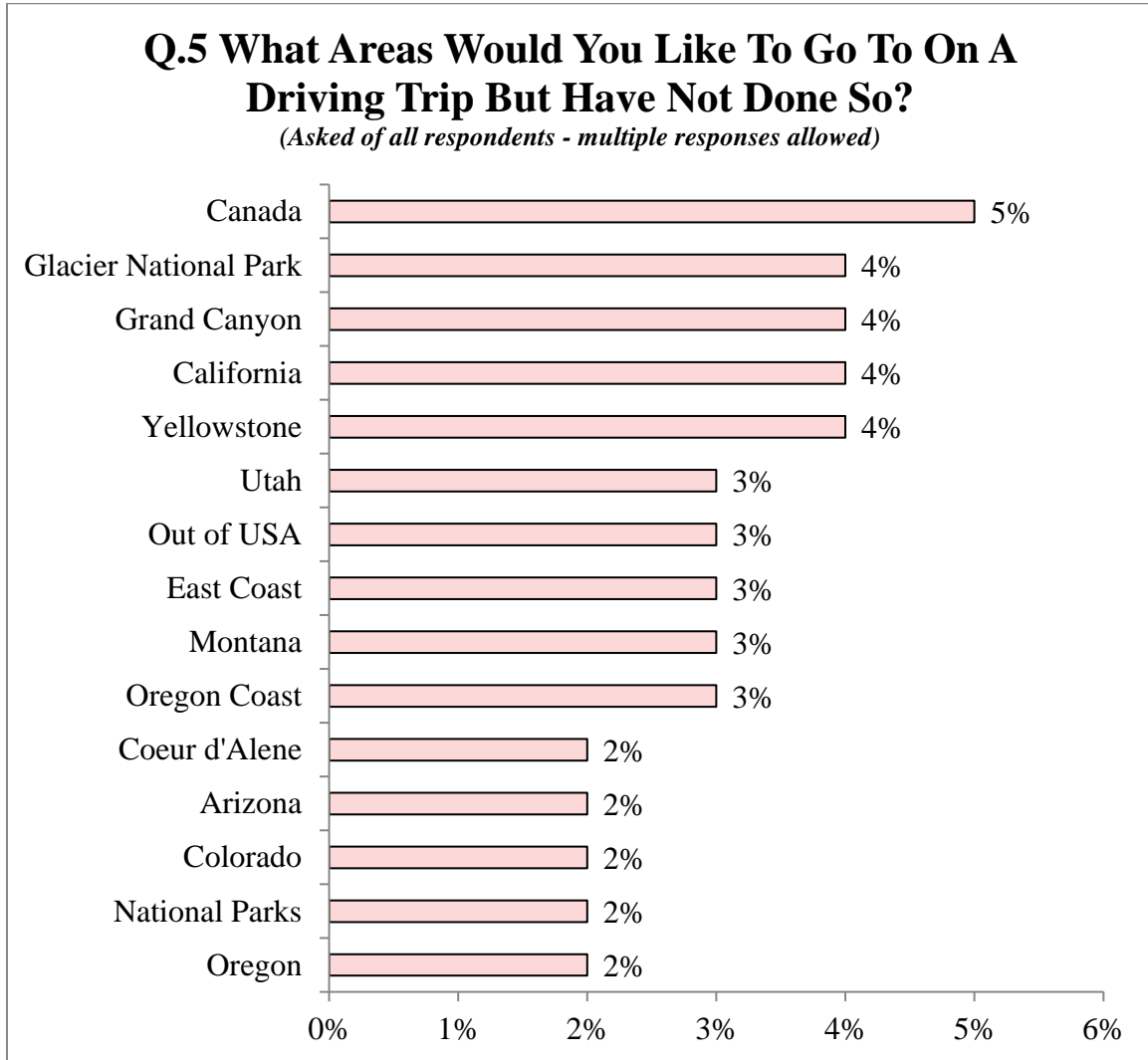
This question was asked of all respondents (n=1,200). Respondents were not read a list of possible responses from which to choose. Multiple responses were allowed.



One in nine (11%) respondents mentioned Coeur d'Alene.

Q.5 What areas would you like to go to on a driving trip but have not done so?

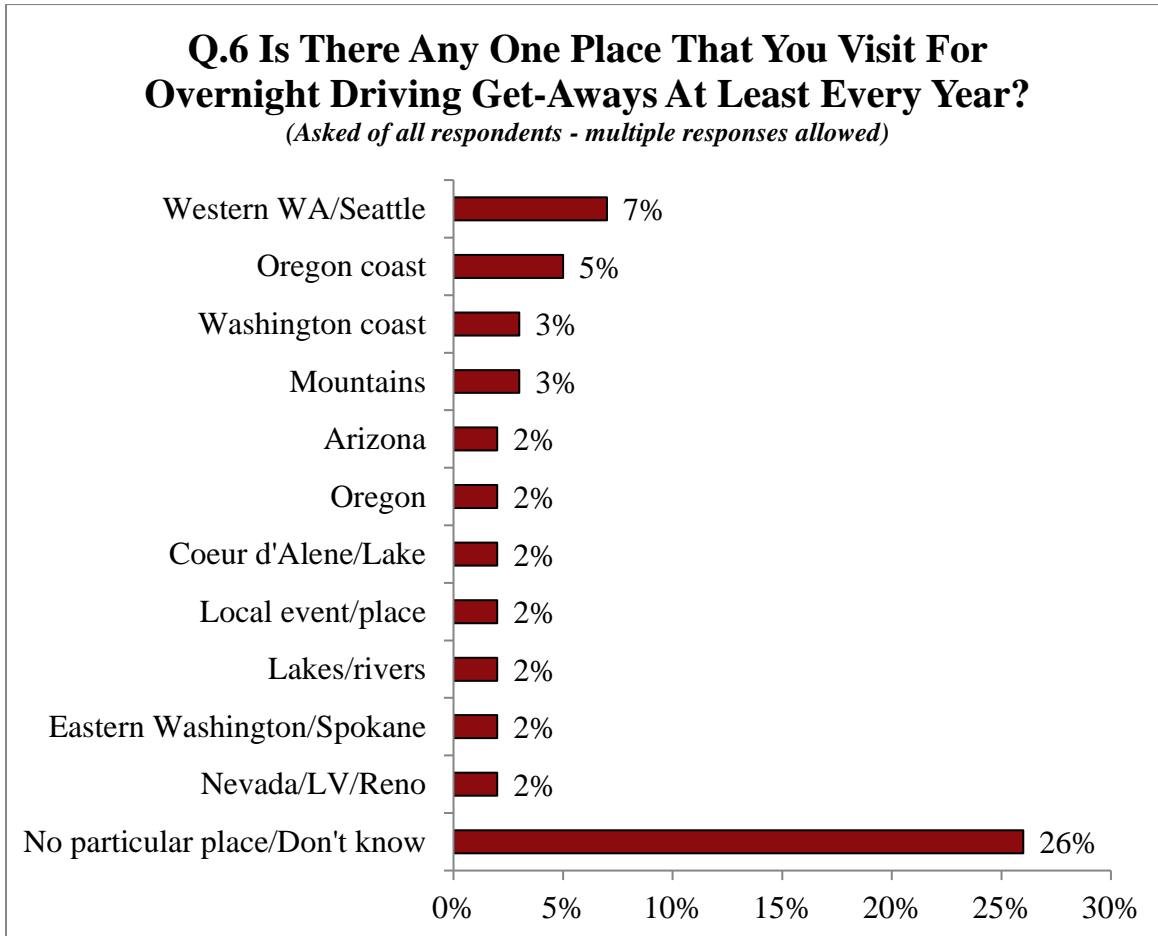
This question was asked of all respondents (n=1,200). Respondents were not read a list of possible responses from which to choose. Multiple responses were allowed.



One in twenty (5%) respondents mentioned Canada. One in fifty (2%) participants mentioned Coeur d'Alene.

Q.6 Is there any one place that you visit for overnight driving get-aways at least every year?

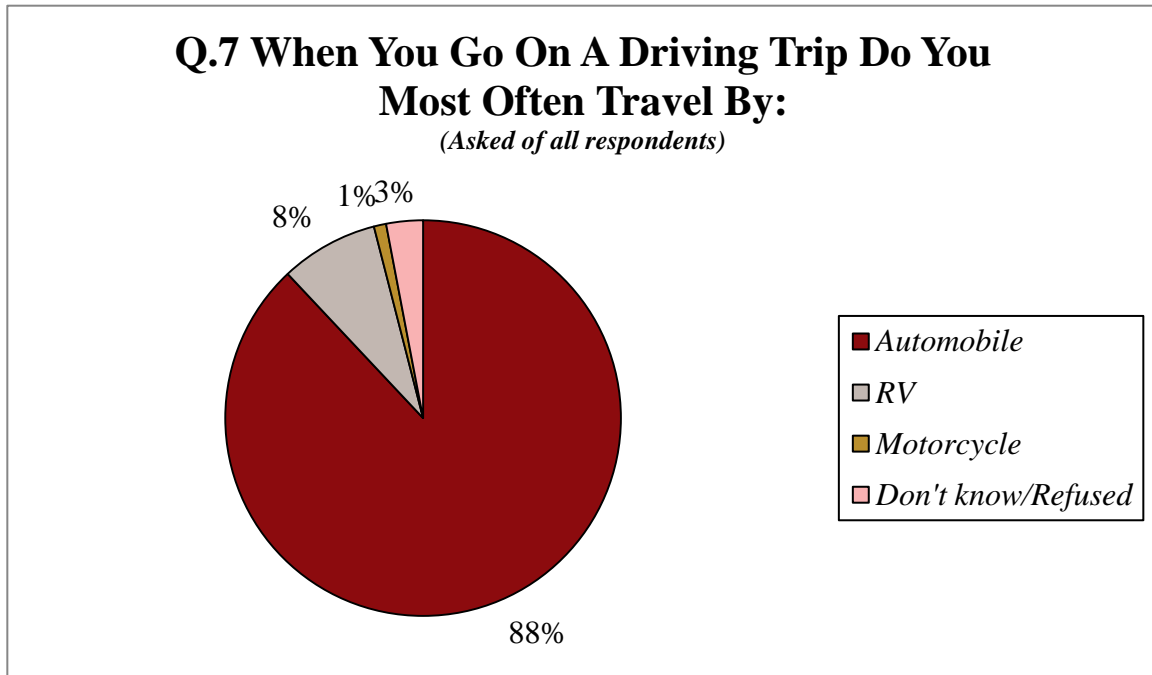
This question was asked of all respondents (n=1,200). Respondents were not read a list of possible responses from which to choose. Multiple responses were allowed.



One in four (26%) respondents reported that there was no particular place. One in fifty (2%) respondents mentioned Coeur d'Alene.

Q.7 When you go on a driving trip do you most often travel by: automobile, RV, or motorcycle?

This question was asked of all respondents (n=1,200). Only one response was allowed.

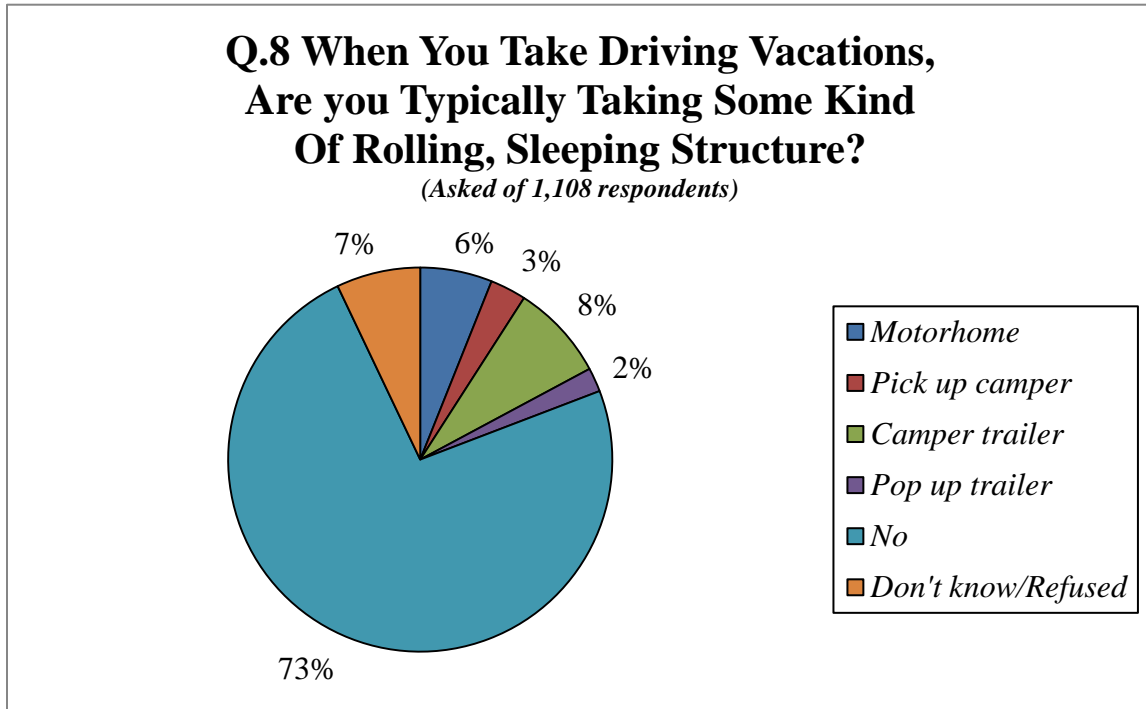


Nine in ten (88%) respondents reported most often traveling by car for a driving trip.

Responses spanned the tested subsets quite evenly.

Q.8 When you take driving vacations, are you typically taking some kind of rolling, sleeping, structure such as a motorhome, pick up camper, camper trailer or pop up trailer with you?

This question was asked of respondents who had not reported most often travelling on driving trips in an RV (n=1,108)



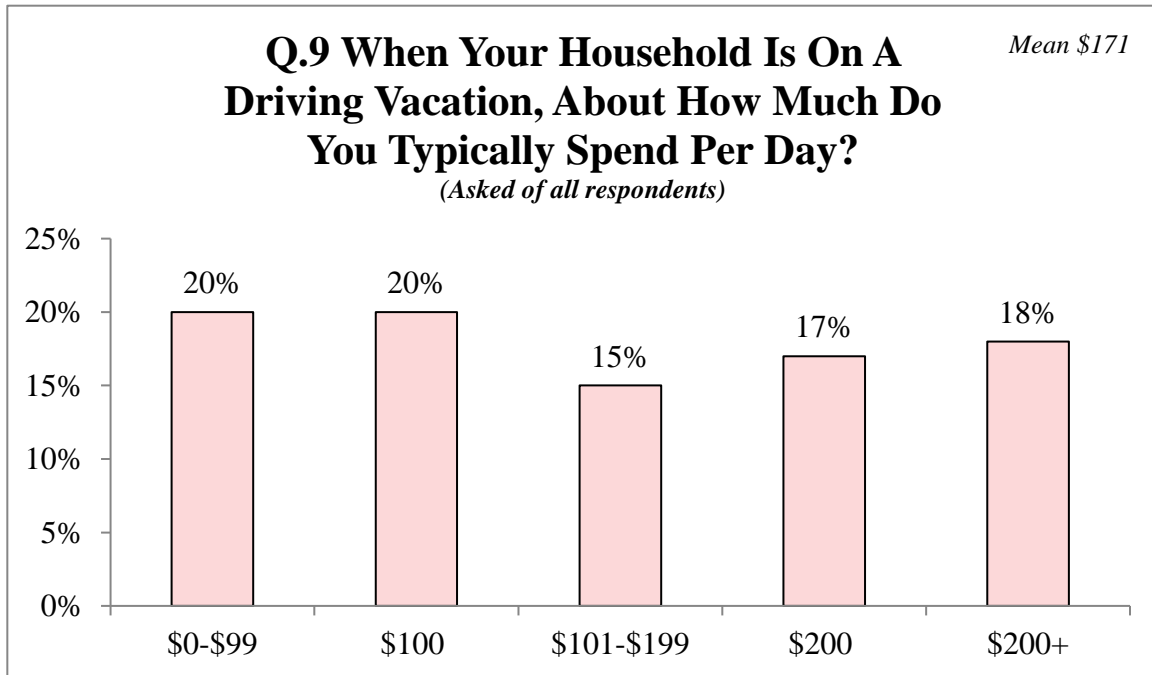
Three in four (73%) respondents reported that when they take a driving vacation they do not take some kind of rolling, sleeping structure.

Respondents residing in Western Montana were more likely than average to report taking a camper trailer.

Participants in British Columbia were more likely than average to respond in the negative.

Q.9 When your household is on a driving vacation, about how much do you typically spend per day?

This question was asked of all respondents (n=1,200).



The average household reported spending \$171 a day when on a driving vacation.

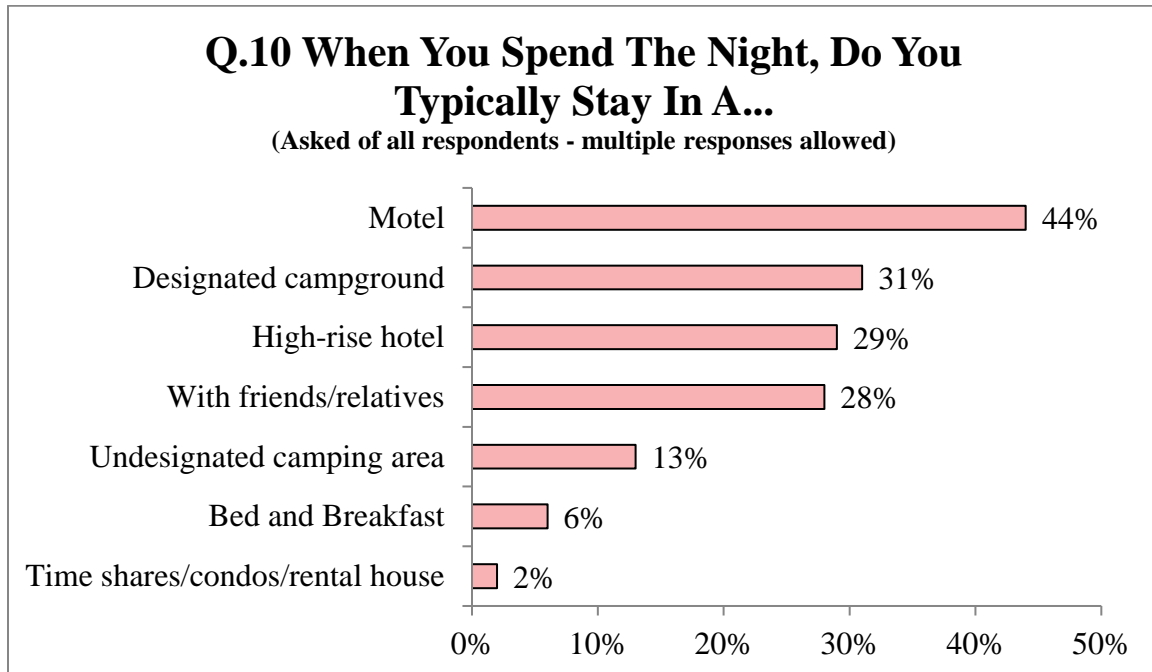
Respondents in Northern and Southern Idaho were more likely than average to report spending less per day.

Participants residing in British Columbia were more likely than average to report spending more money per day.

No allowance was made for international monetary exchange rates.

Q.10 When you spend the night, do you typically stay in a designated campground, an undesignated camping area, a motel, a high-rise hotel, with friends and relatives, or a bed and breakfast?

This question was asked of all respondents (n=1,200). Multiple responses were allowed.



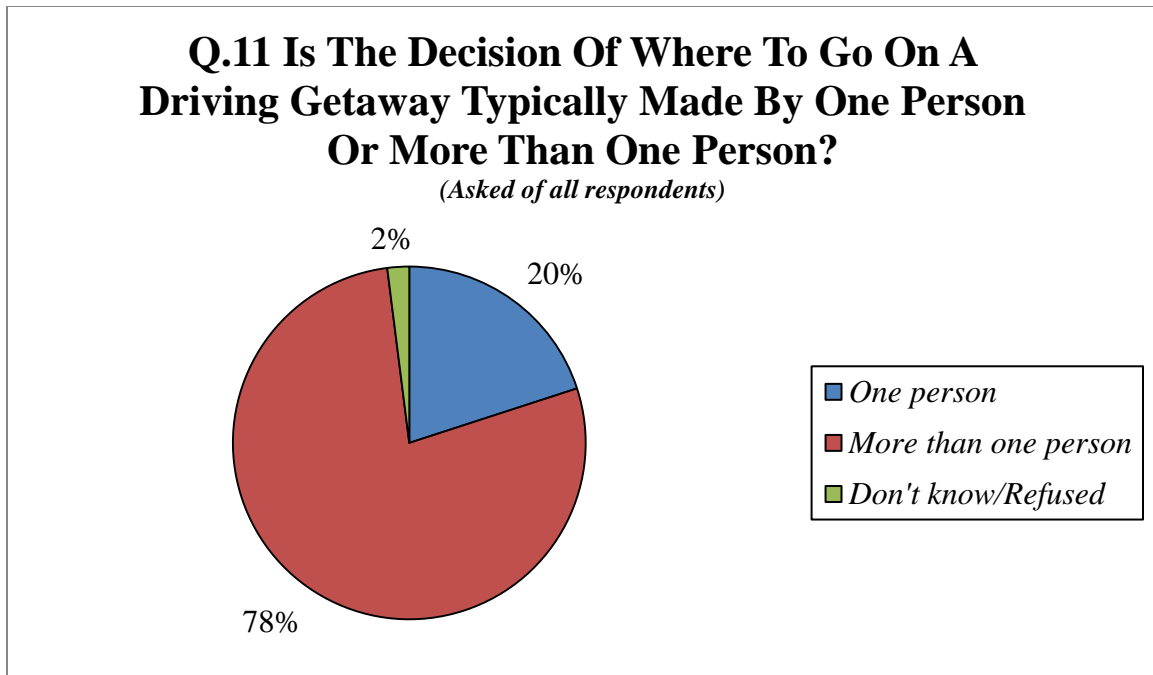
Two in five (44%) respondents reported staying in a motel when they spend the night on a driving vacation.

Likelihood of staying in a motel when spending the night decreased as the number of people residing in the household increased.

Younger respondents were more likely than average to report staying with friends/family or in undesignated camping areas.

Q.11 Is the decision of where to go on a driving getaway typically made by one person or more than one person?

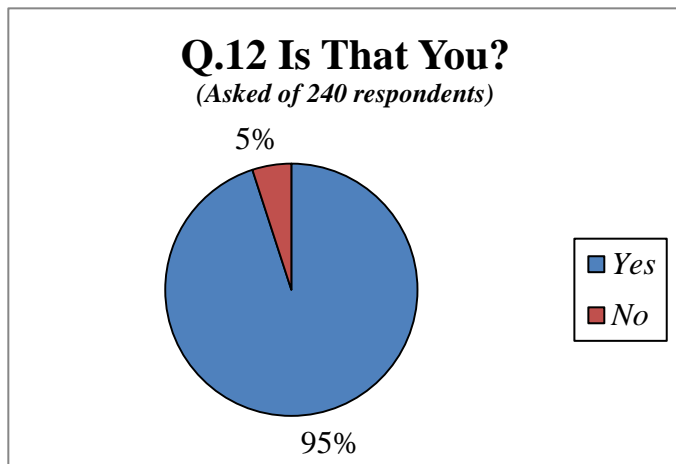
This question was asked of all respondents (n=1,200).



Four in five (78%) respondents reported that the decision on where they go for a driving get-away was typically made by more than one person.

Q.12 Is that you?

This question was asked of respondents who reported that one person made the decision on where to go on a driving getaway (n=240).

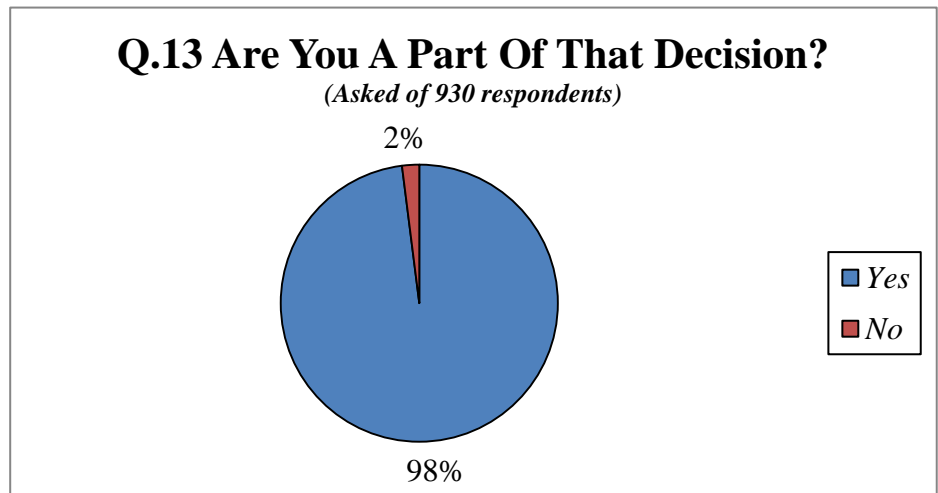


Nine-five percent of respondents who reported that one person made the decision on where to go on a driving vacation also reported that they were the person who made the decision.

Q.13 Are you a part of that decision?

This question was asked of 930 respondents who reported that more than one person made the decision on where to go on a driving getaway.

Ninety-eight percent of respondents who reported that more than one person was responsible for deciding where to go on a driving vacation reported that they were involved in the decision.

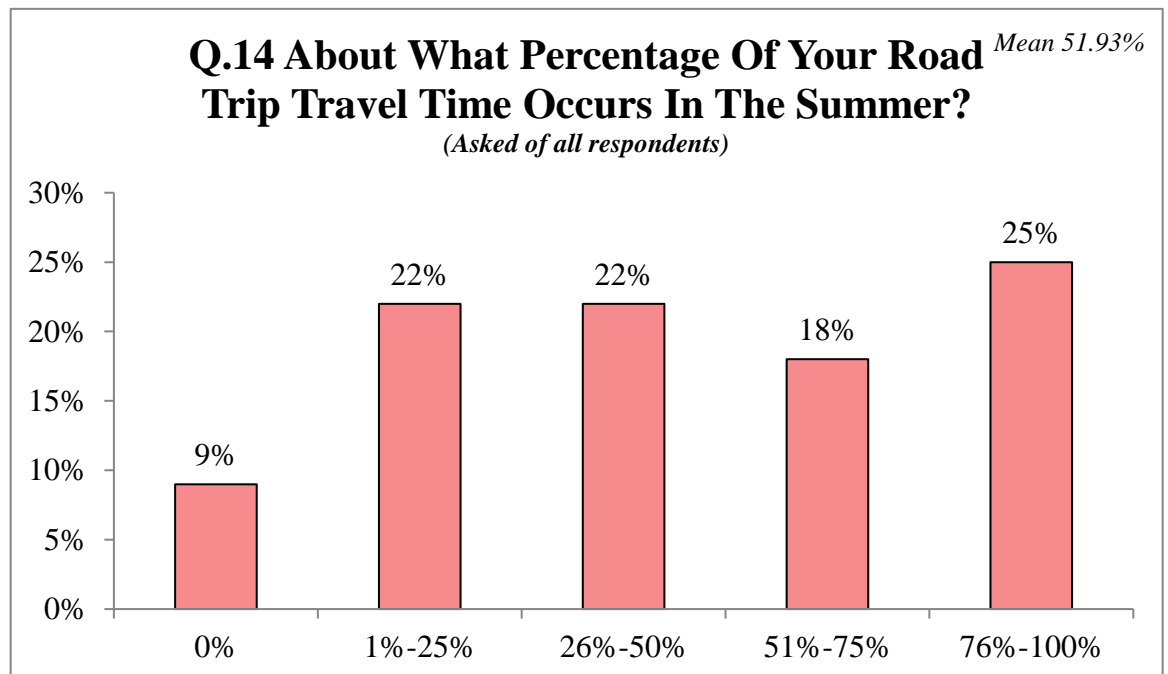


Q.14 In a typical year, about what percentage of your road trip travel time occurs in the Summer, between Memorial Day and Labor Day?

This question was asked of all respondents (n=1,200).

The average respondent reported that 52% of their road trips took place in the summer.

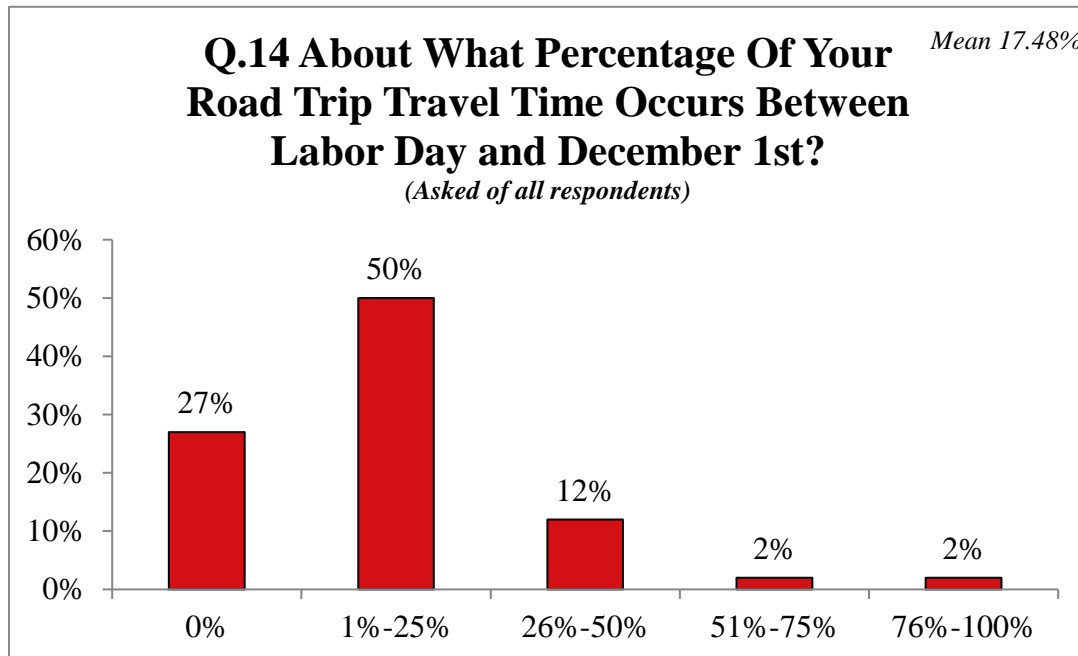
Respondents in Alberta were more likely than average to report a higher percentage.



NOTE: Survey respondents typically have difficulty with responses in percentages adding up to 100%. Remarkably, the average for the four seasons in this series was 99.26%

Q.15 What percentage between Labor Day and December 1st?

This question was asked of all respondents (n=1,200).

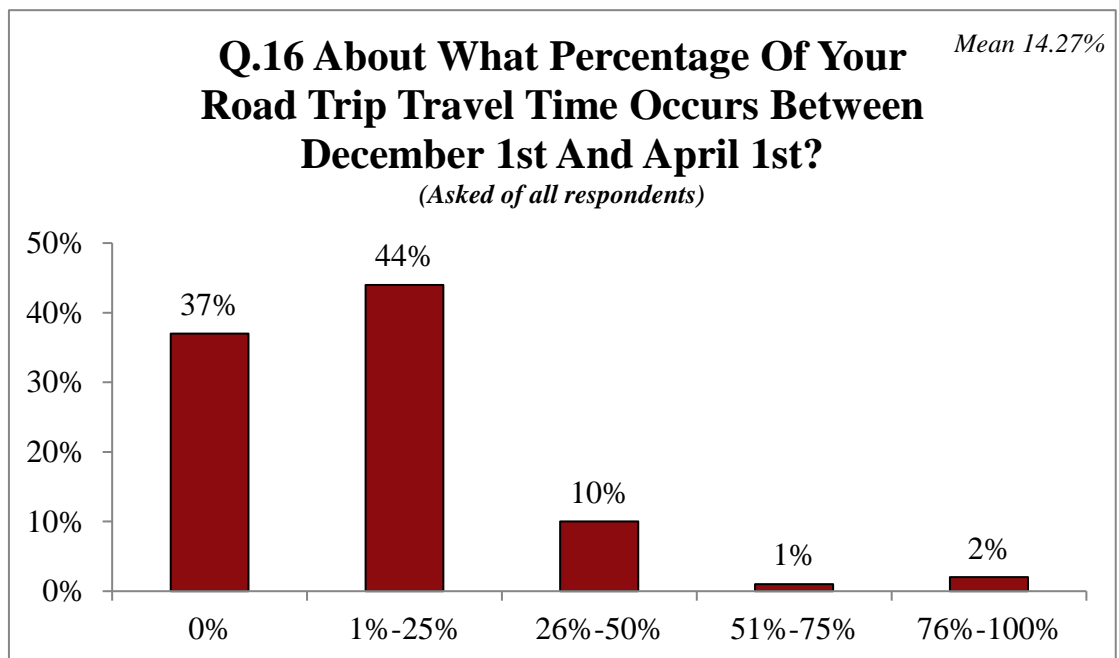


The average respondent reported that 17.48% of their road trips took place between Labor Day and December 1st.

Responses spanned the tested subsets quite evenly.

Q.16 What percentage between Dec 1st and April 1st?

This question was asked of all respondents (n=1,200).

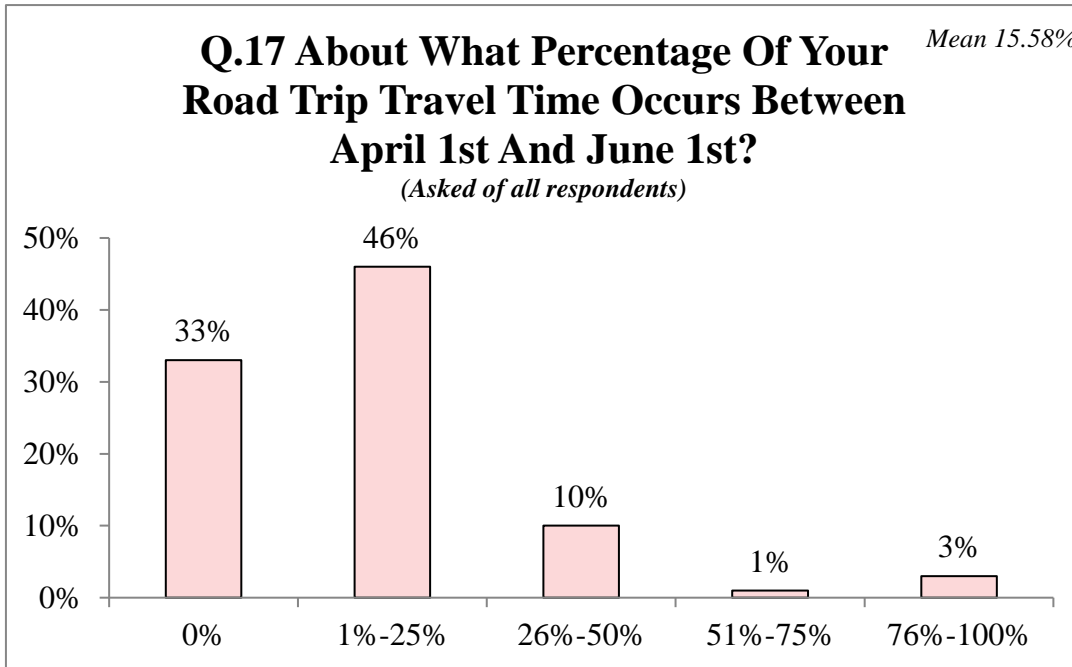


The average respondent reported that 14.27% of their road trips took place between December 1st and April 1st.

Responses spanned the tested subsets quite evenly.

Q.17 What percentage between April 1st and June 1st?

This question was asked of all respondents (n=1,200).



The average respondent reported taking 15.58% of their road trips between April 1st and June 1st.

Respondents age 66 and older were more likely than average to give a higher percentage.

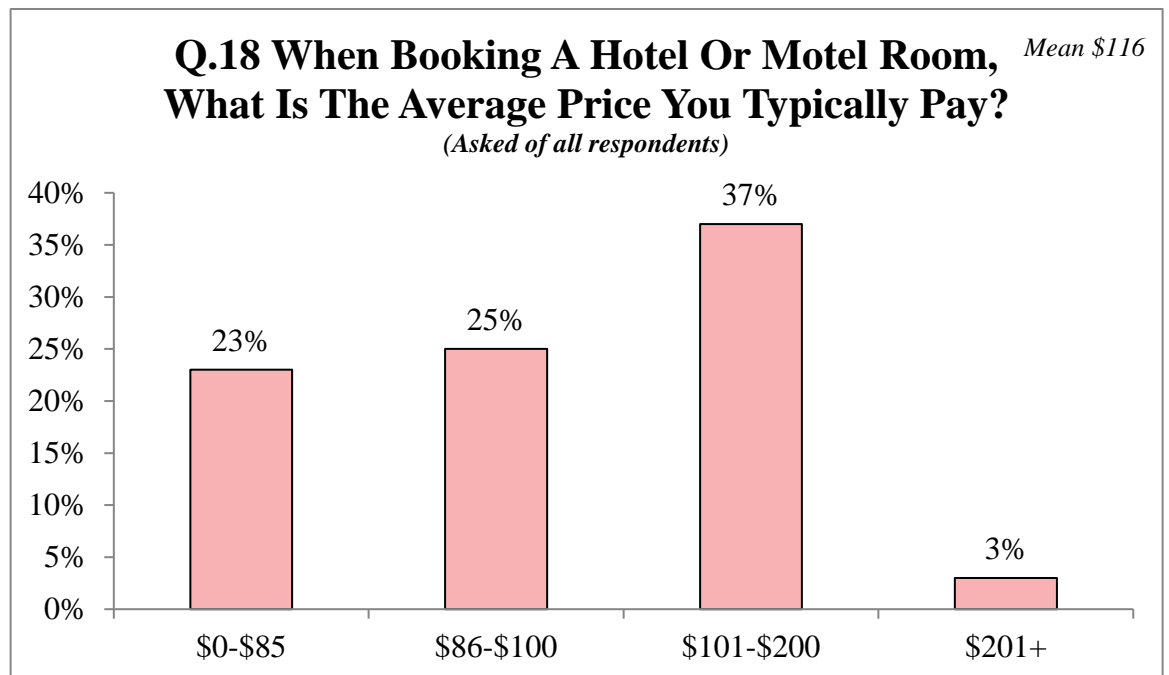
Participants in Eastern Washington were more likely than average to give a higher percentage.

Q.18 When booking a hotel or motel room, what is the average price you typically pay?

This question was asked of all respondents (n=1,200).

The average respondent reported paying \$116 for a hotel/motel room.

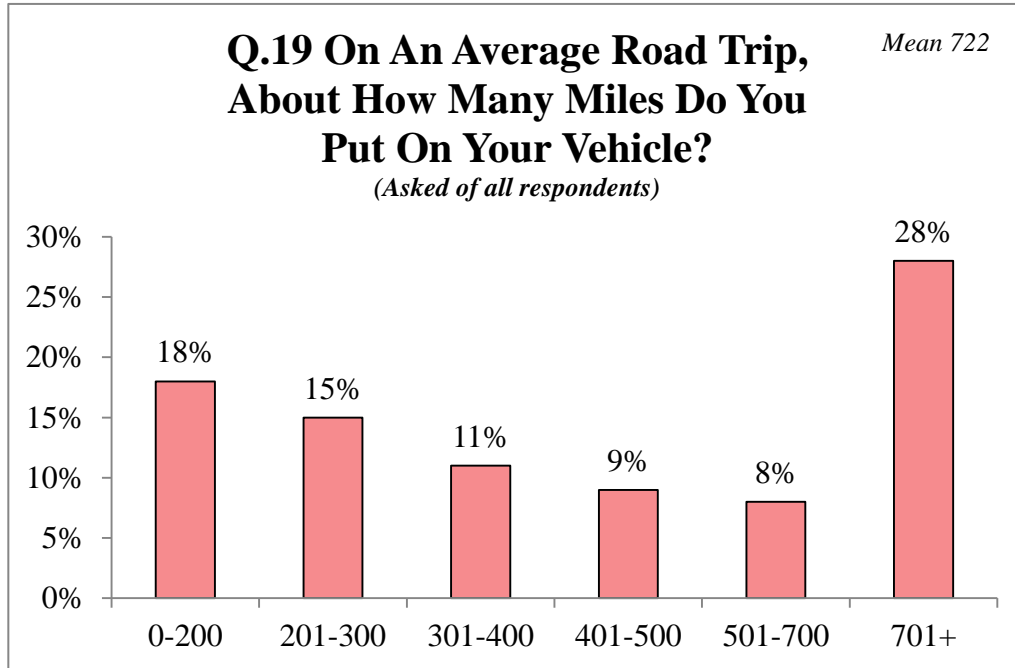
Older respondents were more likely than average to report paying less.



Canadian respondents were more likely than average to report paying significantly more.

Q.19 On an average road trip, about how many miles do you put on vehicle?

This question was asked of all respondents (n=1,200).



The “typical” respondent reported driving 722 miles on an average road trip.

Older respondents were more likely than average to report a higher number.

Canadian respondents were asked this question in kilometers which were then converted to miles to support consistency and subset analysis.

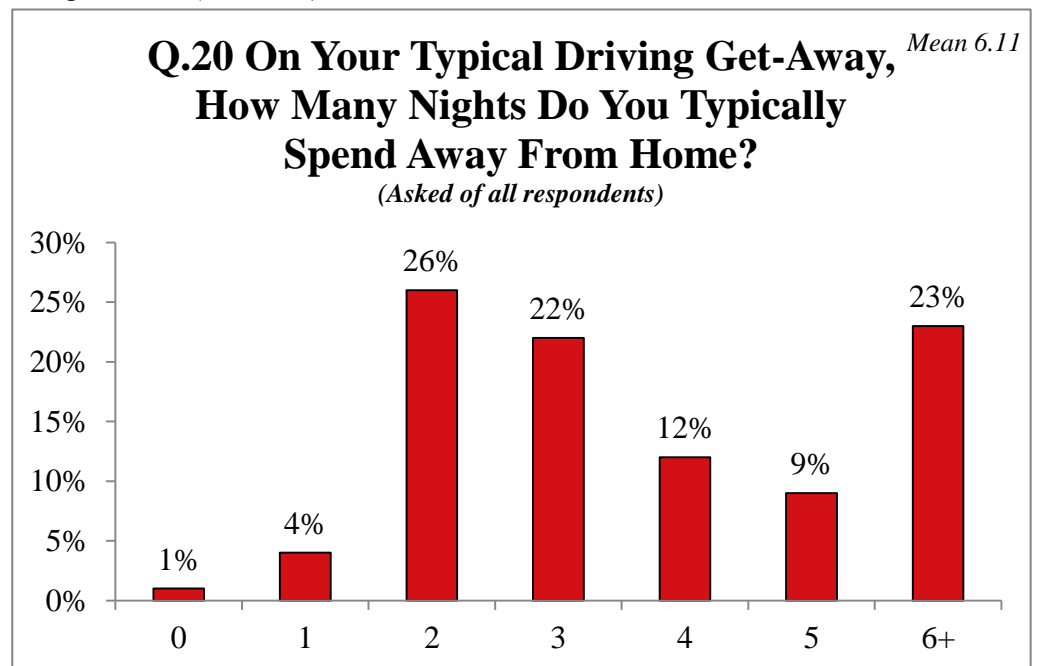
Q.20 On your typical driving get-away, how many nights do you typically spend away from home?

This question was asked of all respondents (n=1,200).

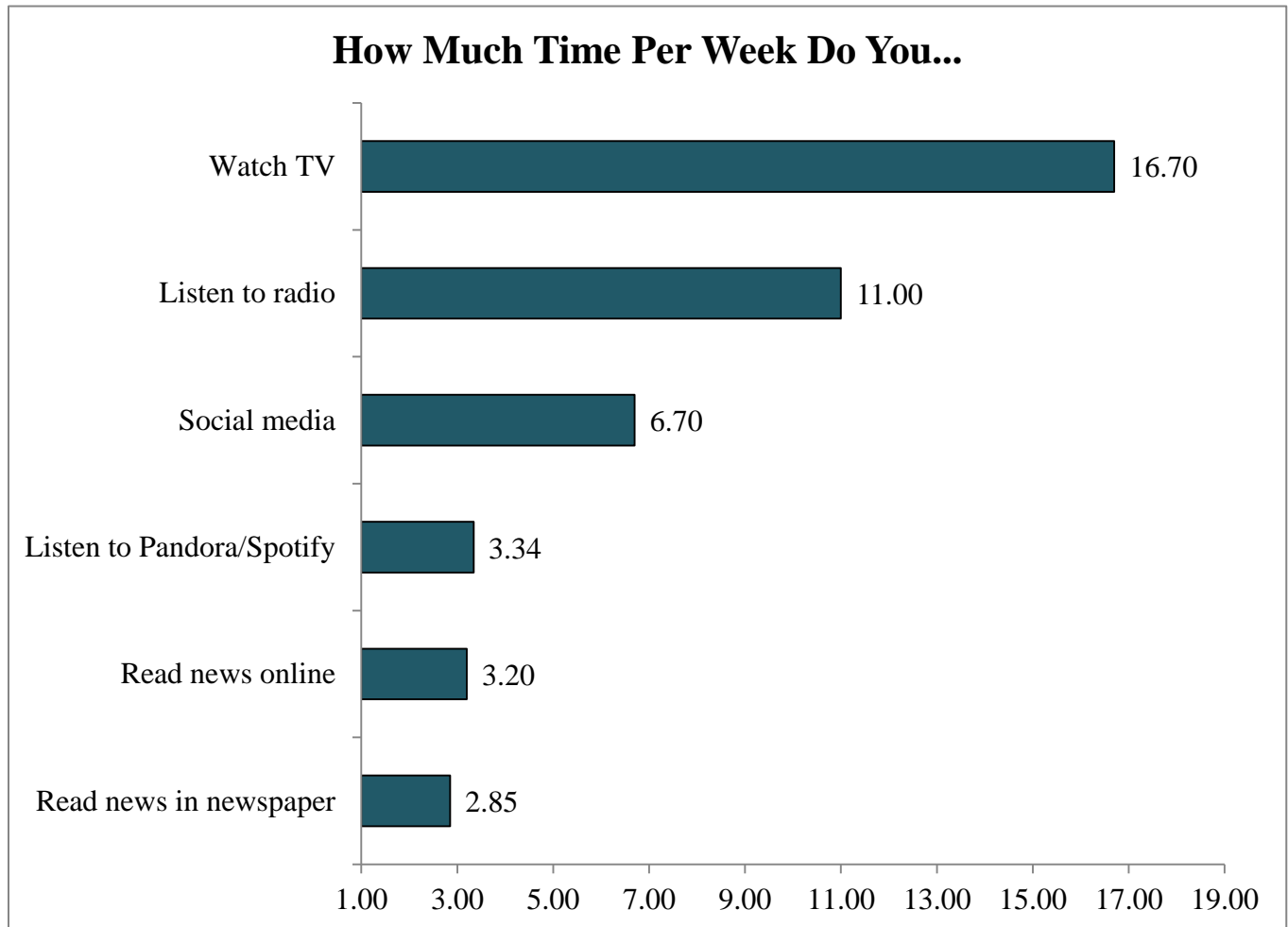
The average respondent reported spending 6.11 nights away on a typical driving get-away.

Respondents with RVs were more likely than average to report more nights.

Participants from Eastern Oregon and Eastern Montana were more likely than average to report staying away for fewer nights. The same was true for respondents with children under the age of 5.

Q.21 Spend on social media

The average respondent reported spending 6.7 hours per week on social media.

Respondents who typically travelled by motorcycle were more likely than average to report spending fewer hours on social media.

Participants who resided in Alberta were more likely than average to report fewer hours.

Q.22 Listen to radio

The average respondent reported spending 11.0 hours per week listening to the radio.

Responses spanned the tested subsets quite evenly.

Q.23 Watch TV

The average respondent reported watching television per week for 16.7 hours.

Viewership increased with age.

Respondents with children in the household were more likely than average to report viewing less TV.

Participants who resided in British Columbia were more likely than average to report viewing less TV.

Q.24 Listen to Pandora or Spotify

The average respondent reported listening to Pandora or Spotify per week for 3.34 hours.

Respondents with children were more likely than average to report listening for more hours.

Participants who resided in Alberta were more likely than average to report listening for fewer hours.

Q.25 Read news online

The average respondent reported reading news online per week for 3.2 hours.

Respondents who reported their household income as \$150,000 or above were more likely than average to report spending more time reading online news.

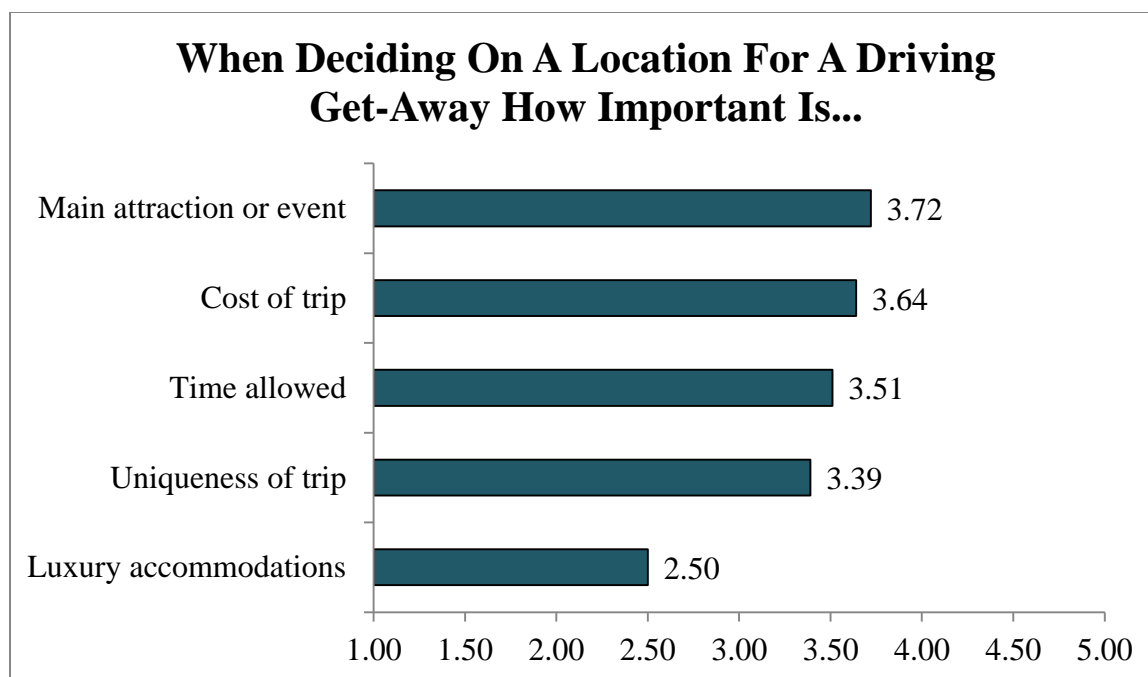
Q.26 Read news in newspaper

The average respondent reported reading news in the newspaper per week for 2.85 hours.

Respondents with children in the household were more likely than average to report spending less time reading news in the paper.

Participants residing in Western Washington were more likely than average to report spending significantly less time reading news in the paper.

Q.27 Cost of trip

The cost of the trip was ranked second among the five tested (3.64).

RV drivers and motorcycle riders were more likely than average to give a lower rating to this consideration.

Female respondents were more likely than average to give a higher rating, as were respondents with children in the household.

Respondents in Western Montana were more likely than average to give a lower rating.

Q.28 Main attraction or event

Main attraction or event was ranked first among the five tested (3.72).

Respondents in the 18 to 25 age group were more likely than average to give a higher rating.

Participants who resided in Alberta were more likely than average to give a lower rating.

Q.29 Time allowed

Time allowed was ranked third among the five tested (3.51).

Older respondents were more likely than average to give a lower rating.

Respondents in Western Montana and Canada were more likely than average to give a lower rating.

Q.30 Uniqueness of trip

Uniqueness of trip was ranked second to last among the five tested (3.39).

Respondents who reported an annual household income of less than \$25,000 were more likely than average to give a lower rating.

Q.31 Luxury accommodations

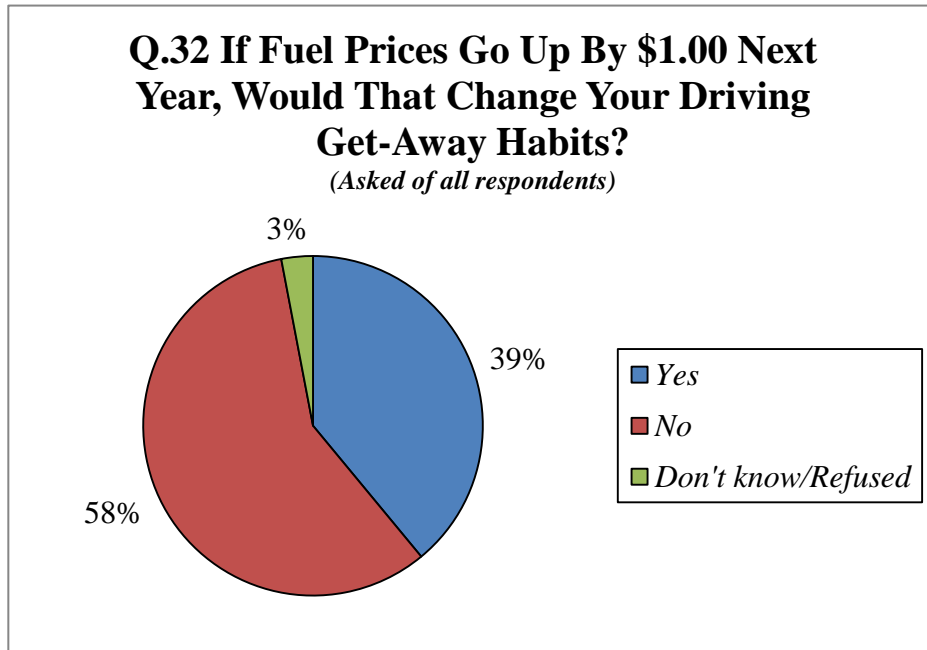
Luxury accommodations was ranked last among the five tested (2.50).

Respondents with children were more likely than average to give a lower rating.

Respondents in Southern Idaho and Western Montana were more likely than average to give a lower rating.

Q.32 If fuel prices go up by \$1.00 next year, would that change your driving get-away habits, or not?

This question was asked of all respondents (n=-1,200).



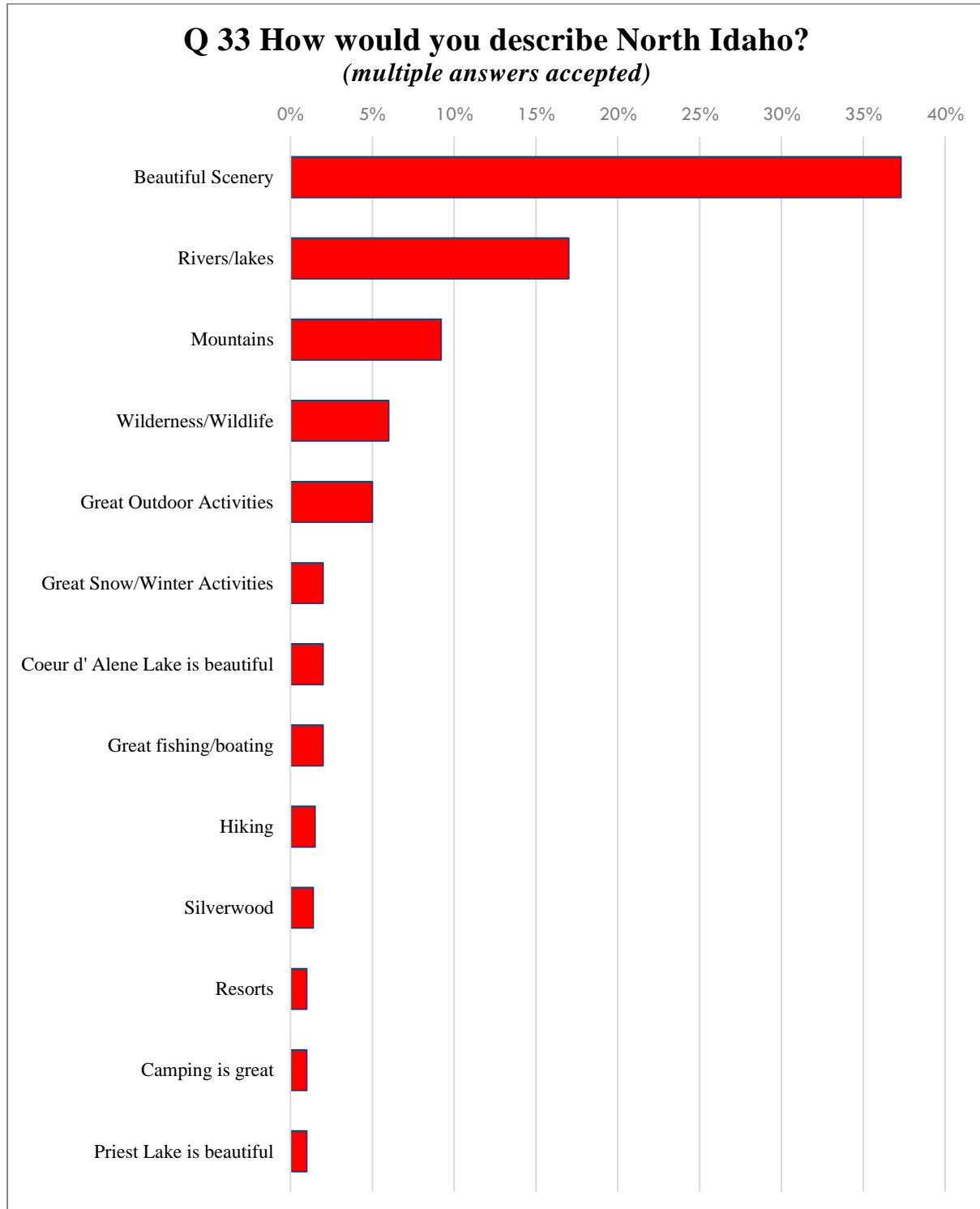
Three in five (58%) reported that a fuel price increase of \$1 would not affect their driving get-away habits.

Respondents who typically rode a motorcycle on their get-aways were significantly less likely to respond in the affirmative.

Respondents in Southern Idaho were more likely than average to respond in the affirmative.

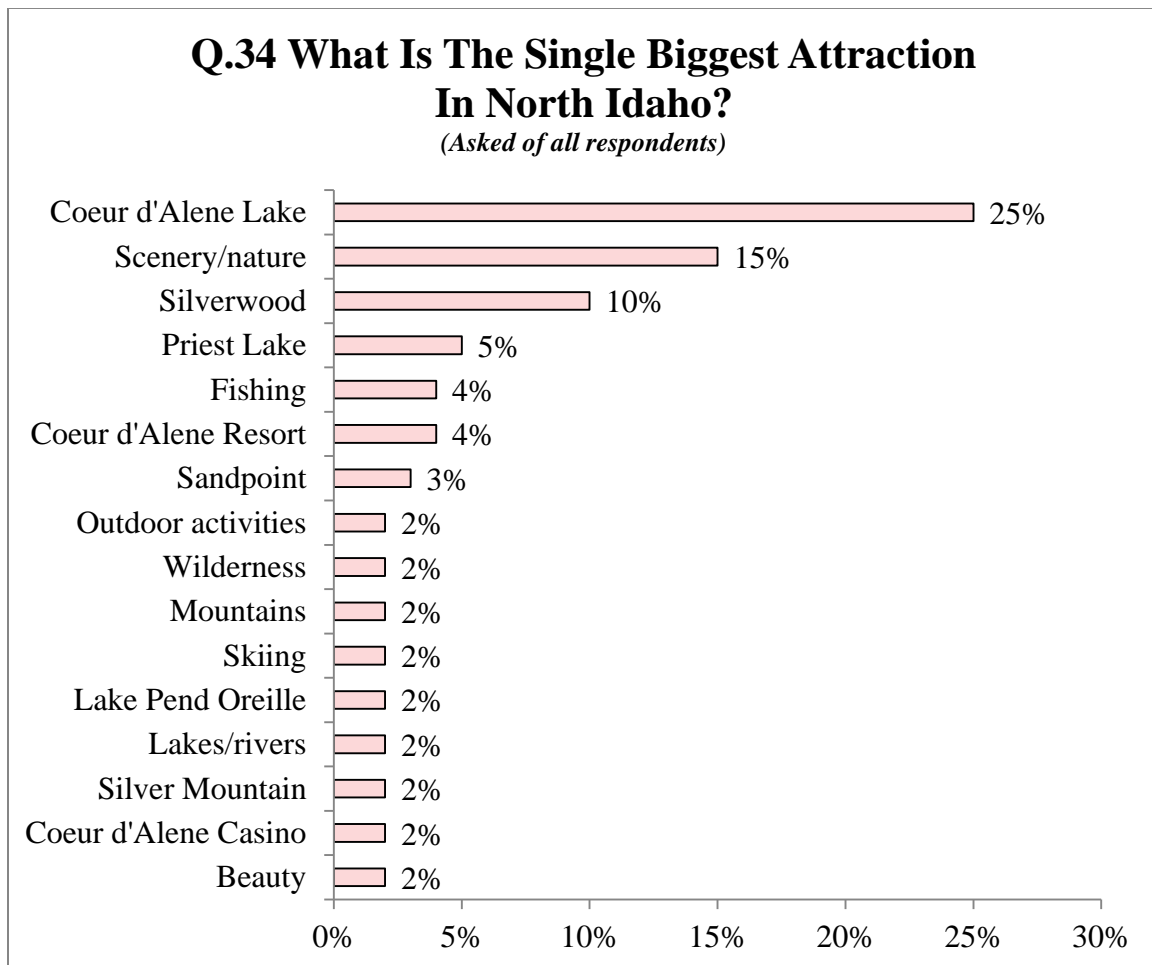
Q.33 How would you describe North Idaho to someone who was not familiar with the area?

This question was asked of all respondents (n=1,200). Responses were captured verbatim and coded for ease of interpretation. Verbatim responses can be found at the end of this report and are recommended reading.



Q.34 In your opinion, what, if anything, is the single biggest attraction in North Idaho?

This question was asked of all respondents (n=1,200). Respondents were not read a list of possible responses from which to choose. Only one response was allowed.

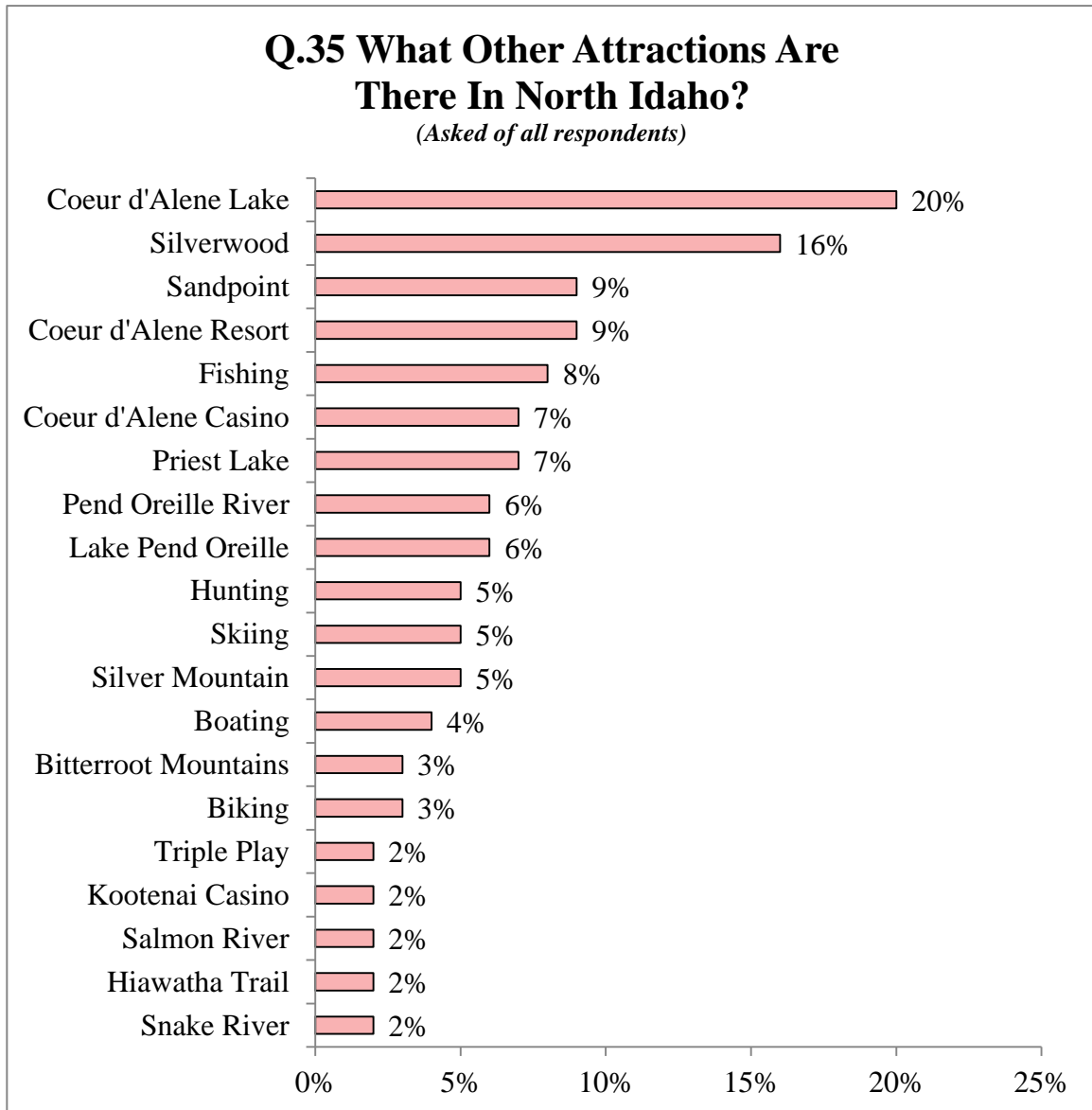


One in four (25%) respondents mentioned Coeur d’Alene Lake.

Respondents in Western Washington were more likely than average to mention scenery/nature.

Q.35 What other attractions are there in North Idaho?

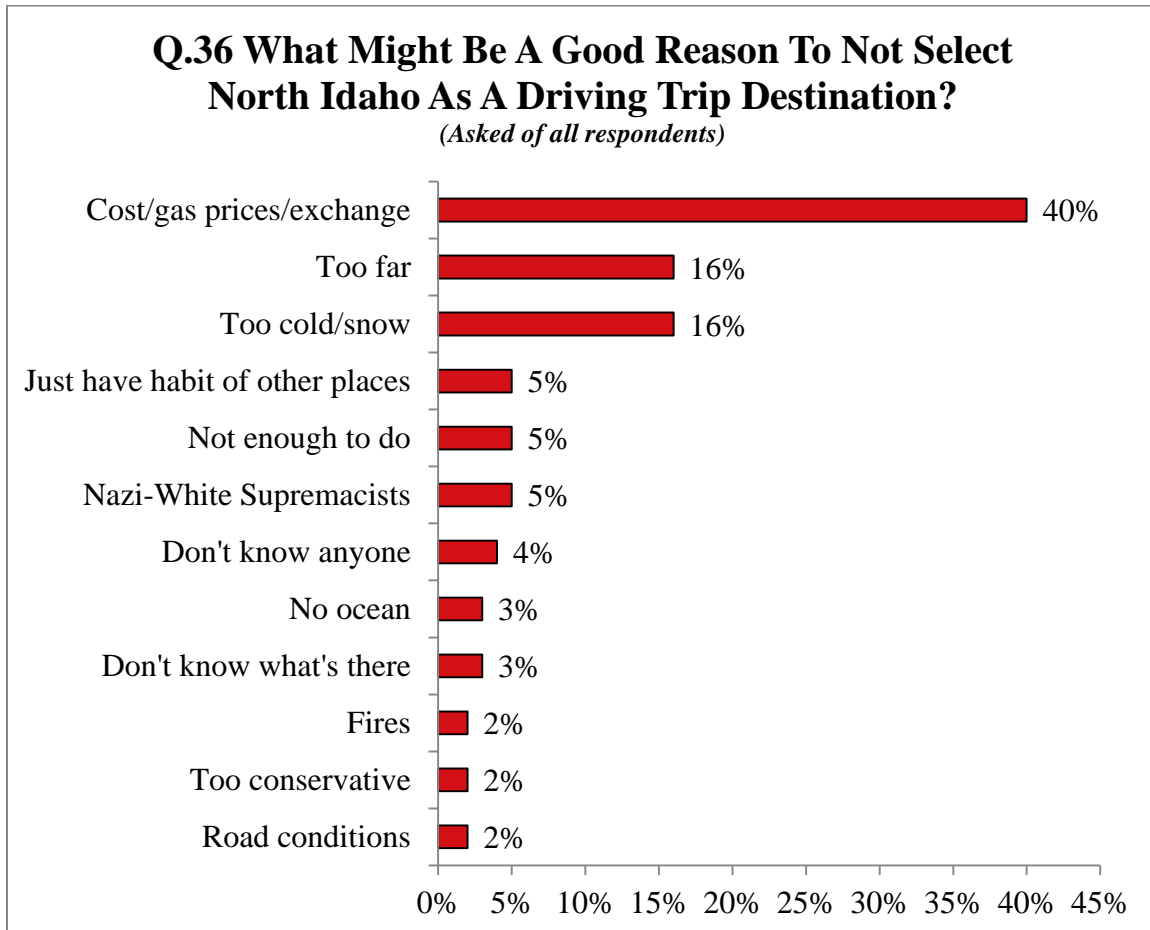
This question was asked of all respondents (n=1,200). Respondents were not read a list of possible responses from which to choose. Multiple responses were allowed.



Overall, nearly half (45%) of respondents mentioned Coeur d'Alene Lake.

Q.36 What, if anything, might be a good reason to not select North Idaho as a driving trip destination?

This question was asked of all respondents (n=1,200). Respondents were not read a list of possible responses from which to choose. Multiple responses were allowed.



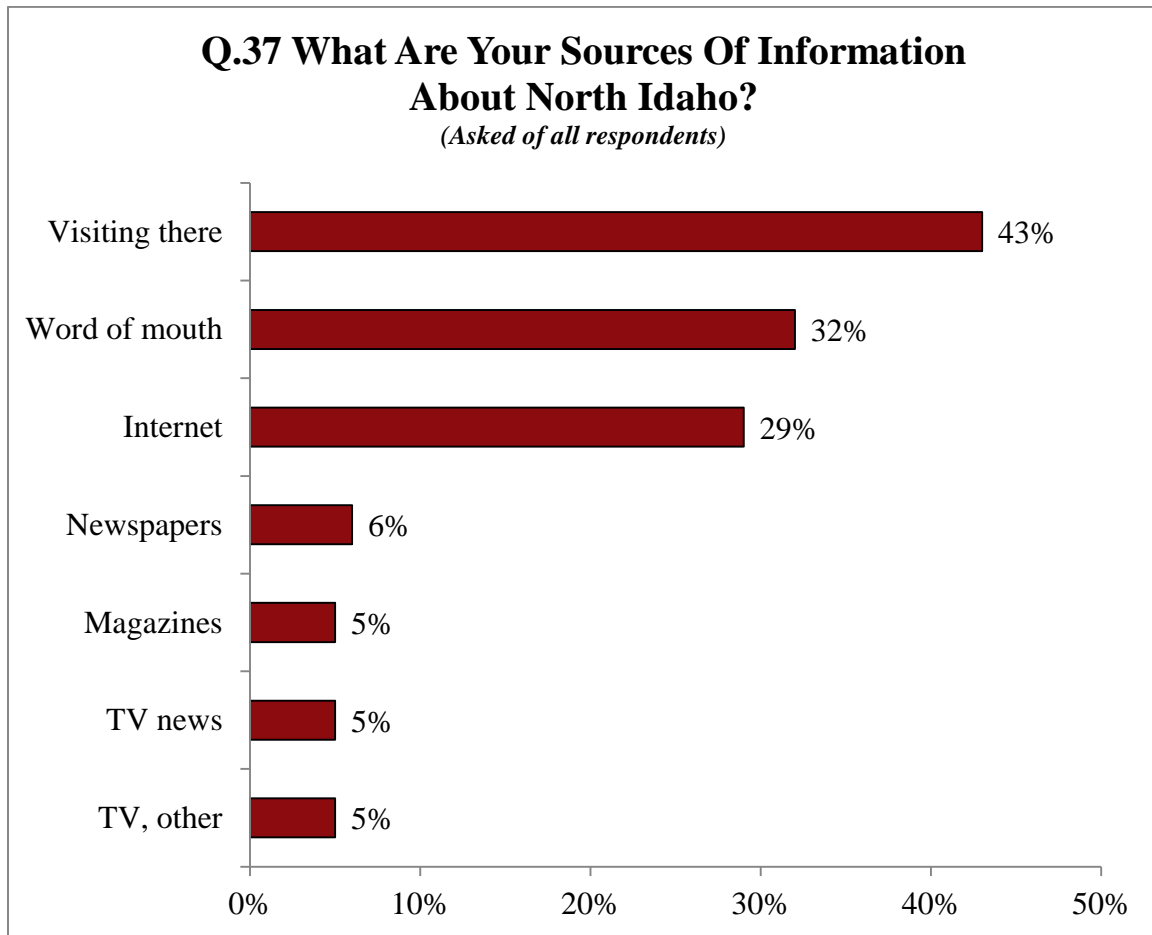
Two in five (40%) respondents reported that cost/gas prices/exchange might be a good reason to not visit North Idaho.

Likelihood of mentioned cost/gas prices/exchange increased as the age of the respondent increased.

Respondents in Western Washington were more likely than average to mention too far as a reason.

Q.37 What are your sources of information about North Idaho?

This question was asked of all respondents (n=1,200). Respondents were not read a list of possible responses from which to choose. Multiple responses were allowed.

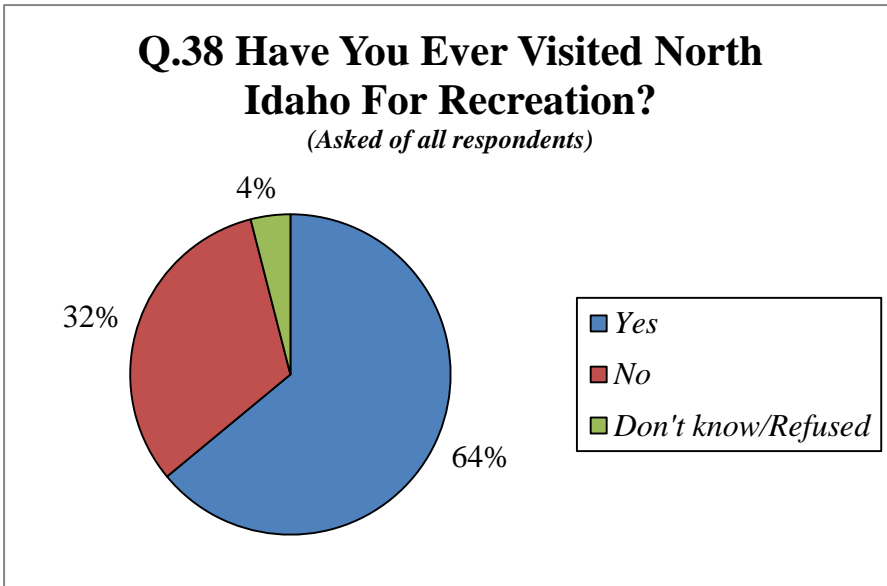


Two in five (43%) respondents reported that their source of information was visiting there.

Respondents in Western Washington were more likely than average to report that their source of information was the internet.

Q.38 Have you ever visited North Idaho for recreation?

This question was asked of all respondents (n=1,200) including residents of North Idaho.



Two in three (64%) respondents reported having ever visited North Idaho for recreation.

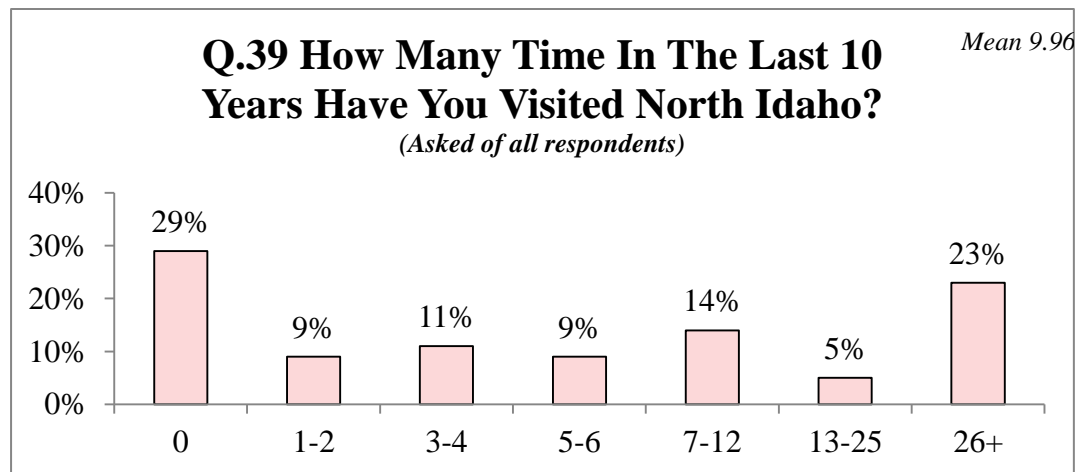
Respondents in Western Washington and Canada were more likely than average to have reported having never visited North Idaho for recreation.

Q.39 Approximately how many times in the last 10 years have you visited North Idaho for recreational purposes?

This question was asked of all respondents (n=1,200).

The average respondent reported visiting North Idaho 9.96 times over the past ten years.

Respondents in Eastern Washington were more likely than average to report visiting more often.

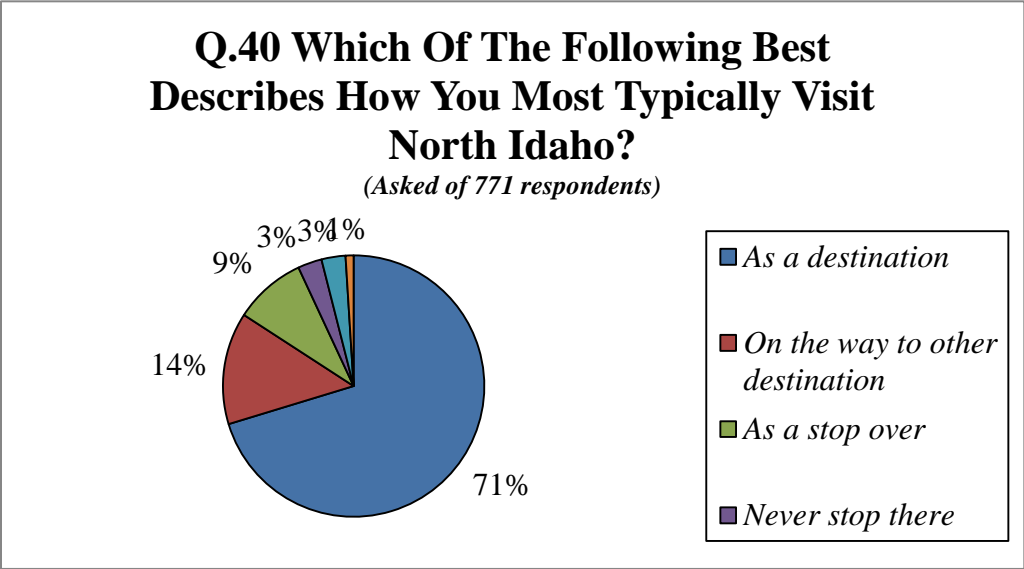

Q.40 Which of the following best describes how you most typically visit North Idaho?

This question was asked of respondents who reported having ever visited North Idaho for recreation (n=771).

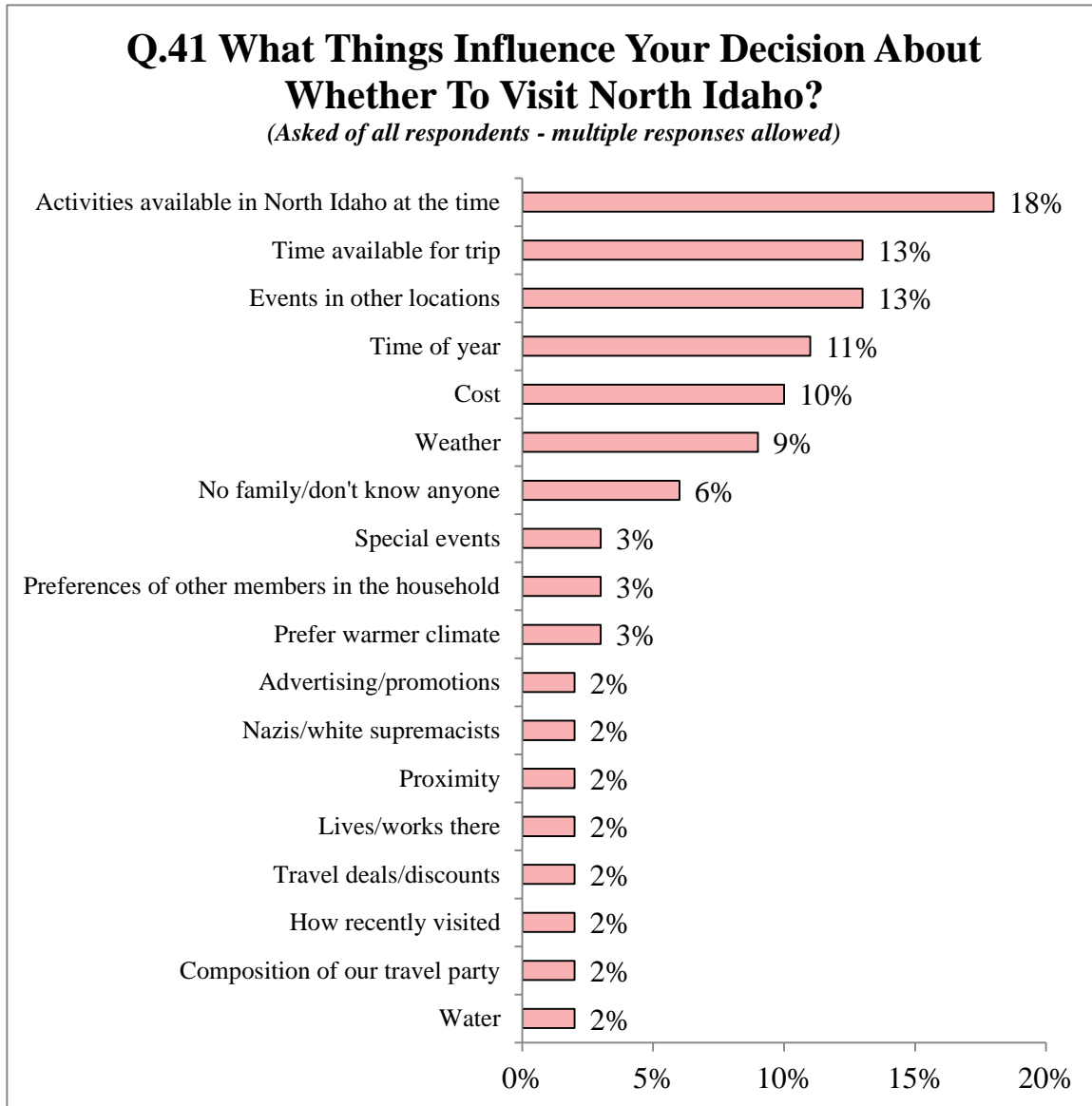
Seven in ten (71%) respondents described typically visiting North Idaho as a destination.

Respondents who typically drove an RV on get-aways were more likely than average to describe it as a stop on the way to another destination.



Q.41 What things influence your decision about whether to visit NI or visit some other location instead?

This question was asked of all respondents (n=1,200) Respondents were not read a list of possible responses from which to choose. Multiple responses were allowed.

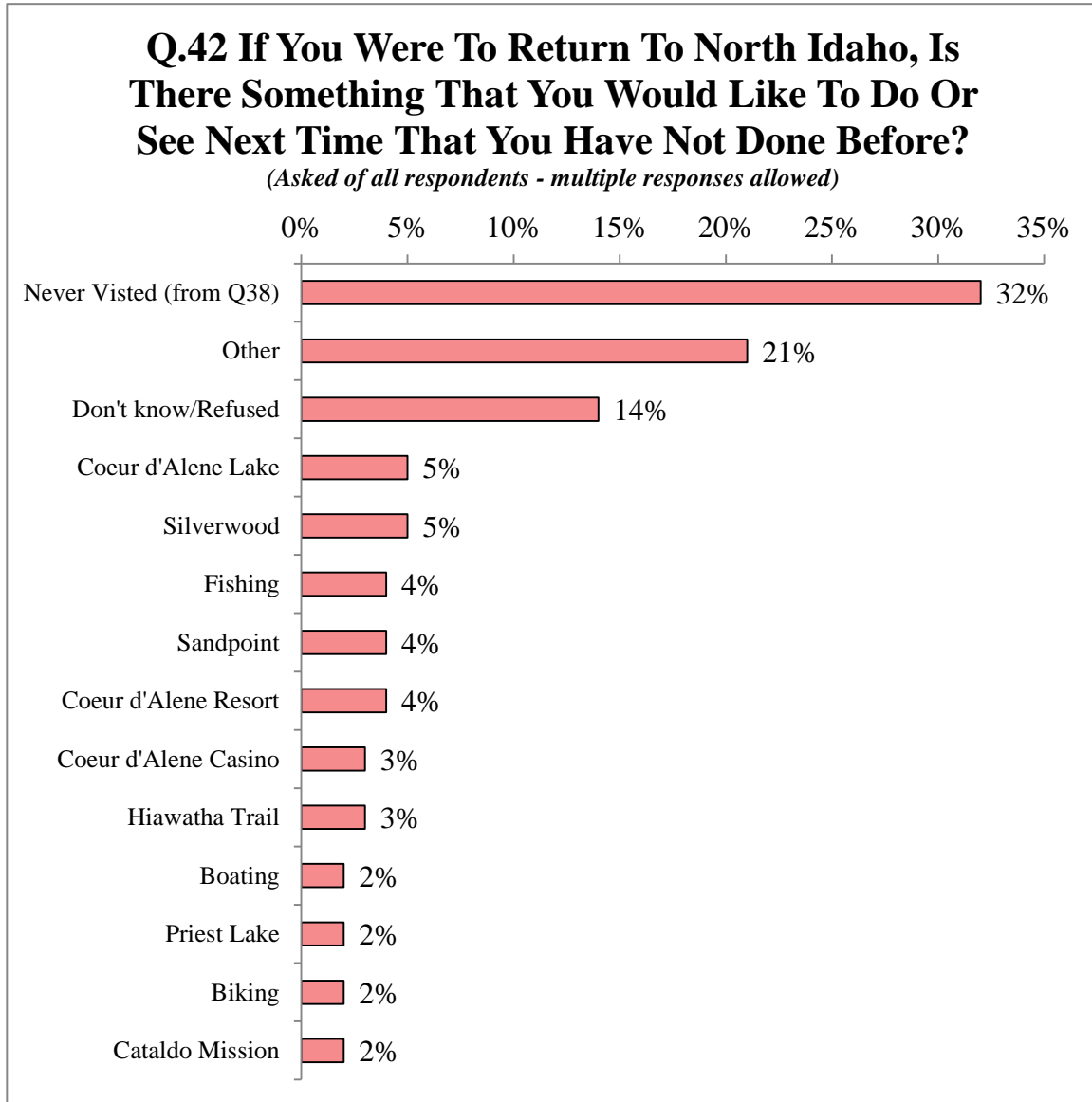


One in six (18%) respondents reported that what activities were available in North Idaho at the time influenced their decision on whether to visit.

Respondents in Western Washington were more likely than average to mention having a condo/cabin/timeshare somewhere else.

Q.42 If you were to return to North Idaho, is there something that you would like to do or see next time that you've not done before?

This question was asked of the 816 respondents who had ever been to North Idaho. The following graph shows the percentages based on all 1,200. Respondents were not read a list of possible responses from which to choose. Multiple responses were allowed.

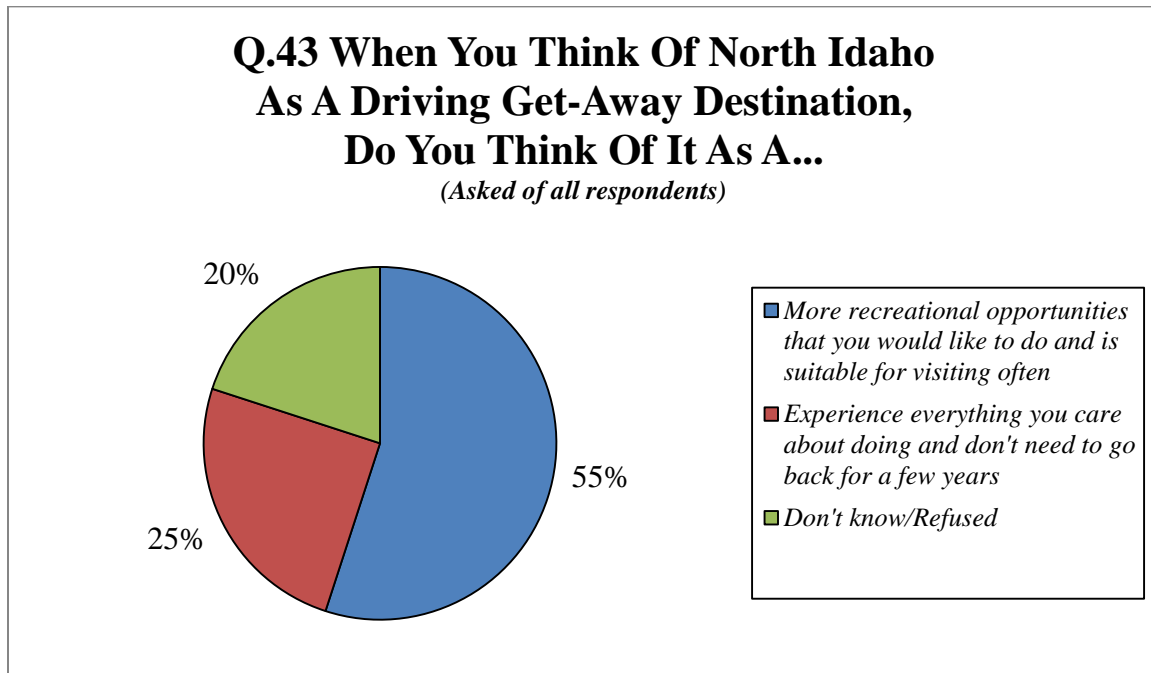


One in twenty (5%) respondents mentioned Silverwood or Coeur d'Alene Lake.

Respondents in Western Washington were less likely than average to mention Coeur d'Alene Lake.

Q.43 When you think of North Idaho as a driving get-away destination, do you think of it as a place where you can experience everything you care about doing and don't need to go back for a few years, or, do you think of it as a place with more recreational opportunities that you would like to do and is suitable for visiting often?

This question was asked of all respondents (n=1,200).



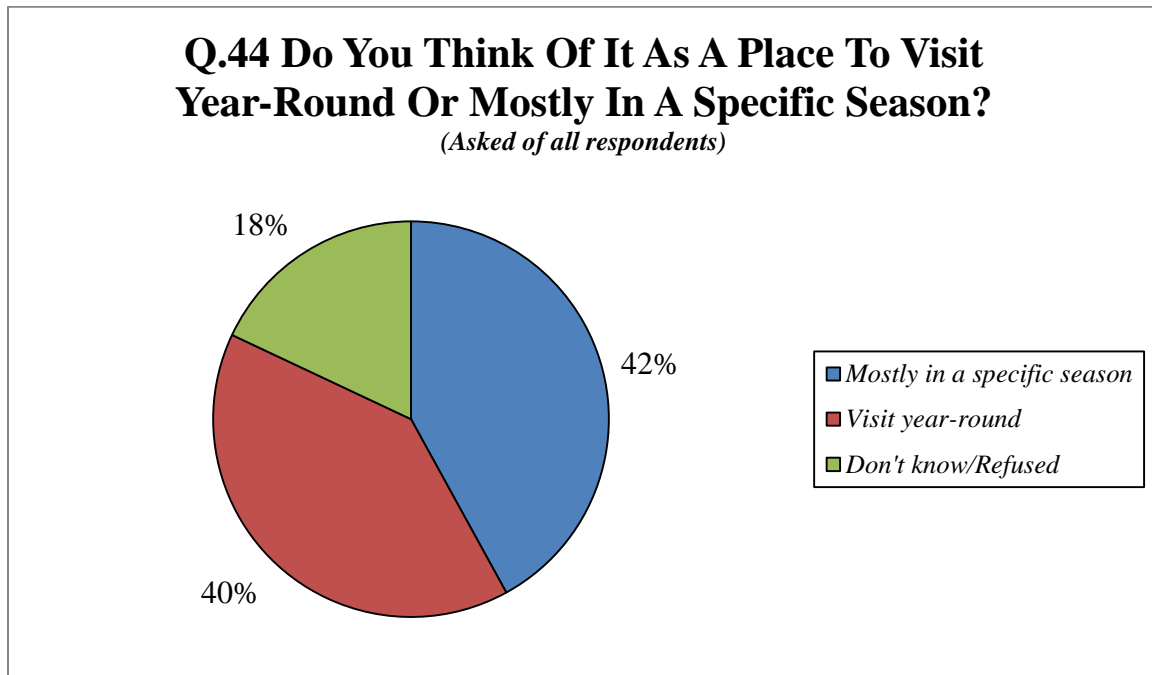
More than half (55%) of respondents thought of North Idaho as a place suitable for visiting often.

Younger respondents were more likely than average to think of North Idaho as a place suitable for visiting often.

Respondents in Western Washington were significantly more likely than average to have thought of North Idaho as a place you don't need to go back to for a few years.

Q.44 When you think of North Idaho, do you think of it as a place to visit year-round or mostly in a specific season?

This question was asked of all respondents (n=1,200).



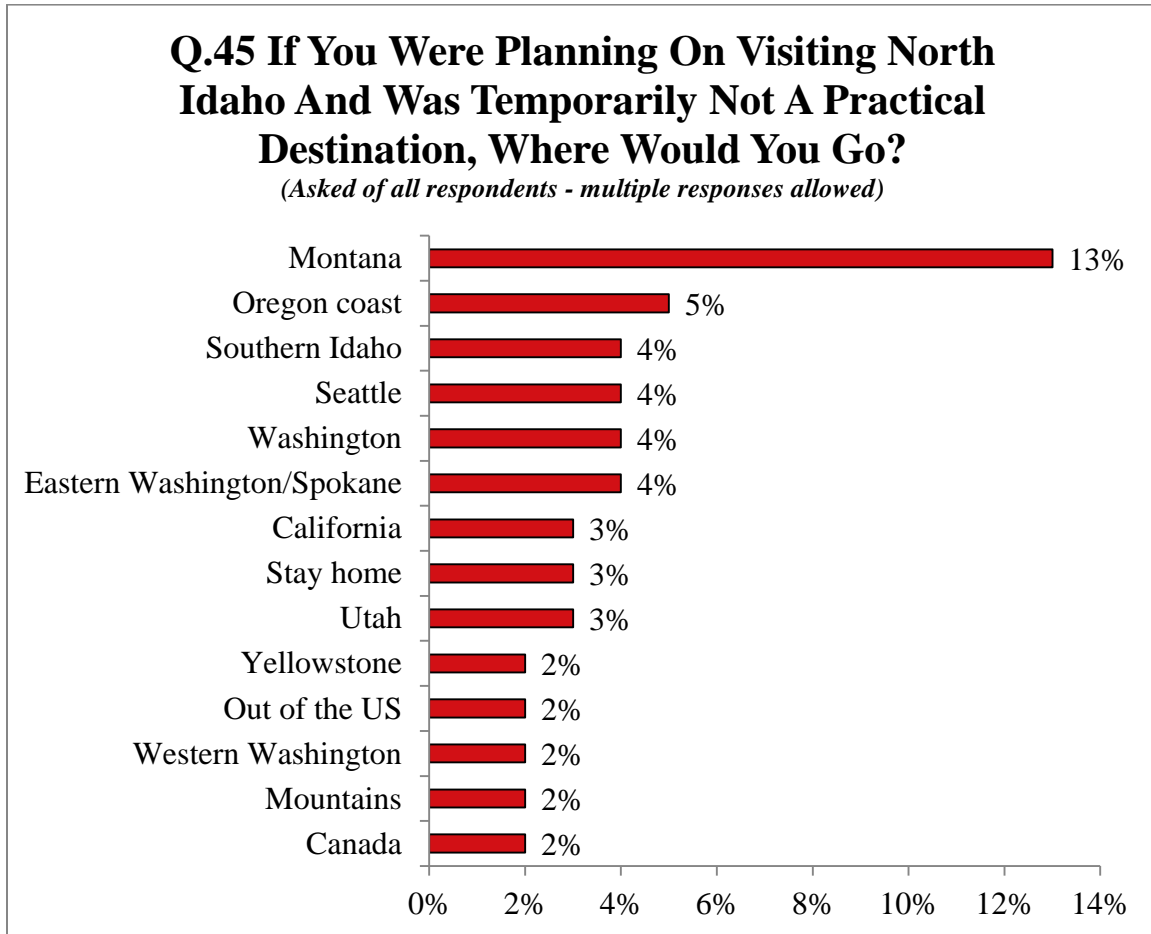
A nearly even proportion of respondents thought of North Idaho as a place to visit year-round or a place to visit mostly during a specific season.

Respondents that had been to North Idaho were more likely than average to think of it as a place to visit year-round.

Participants in Western Washington were more likely than average to think of North Idaho as a place to visit during a specific season.

Q.45 If you were planning on visiting North Idaho and for some reason it was temporarily not a practical destination, say, for instance, a forest fire, and you had to determine an alternative region for your trip, what would be your first choice?

This question was asked of all respondents (n=1,200). Respondents were not read a list of possible responses from which to choose. Multiple responses were allowed.



One in eight (13%) respondents mentioned Montana as an alternate place to go.

Respondents in Western Washington were more likely than average to mention Oregon.

DEMOGRAPHIC PROFILE

- The average household had 2.63 inhabitants
- The mean age of respondents was 57.32 (NOTE: Sample was “active” households)
- One in fourteen respondents reported that a child under the age of five lived in the household
- One in eight respondents reported that a child between the ages of five and twelve lived in the household
- One in eight respondents reported that a child between the ages of thirteen and seventeen resided in the household
- Overall, one in five households had a child residing within
- Fifty-four percent of respondents were female
- The average reported household income was \$78,330 (higher than random sampling not determined to be “active”)
- 62% of the surveys were conducted with respondents on landlines while 38% were conducted with respondents who were using cell phones.
